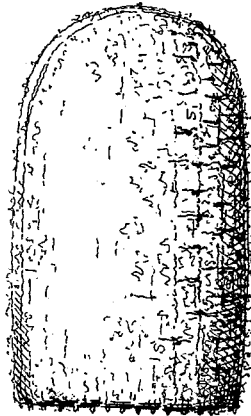
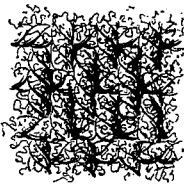

IMPROVEMENT IN HORSE-BRUSHES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. **188,843**, dated March 27, 1877; application filed February 26, 1877.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, CHARLES W. BEISER, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a new and Improved Horse-Cleaner, of which the following is a specification:

Figure 1 is a side elevation of my improved horse-cleaner. Fig. 2 is a detail view, showing the manner in which it is woven.

Similar letters of reference indicate corresponding parts.

The object of my invention is to provide an inexpensive, durable, and effective device for cleaning horses and other animals.

My invention consists of a mitten woven from heavy cords made of horse-hair, so as to present a rough exterior surface.

In carrying out my invention I take horse-hair and twist it into heavy cords or threads, and then, by a process of hand-weaving, form it into a mitten, either with or without a thumb-piece.

Any style of weaving may be employed that will produce a knotty or rough exterior.

The cleaner is placed upon the hand and used in the same manner as brushes.

When the cleaner becomes filled and dirty it may be cleansed by washing it with water and soap.

The advantages claimed for it are, that it is effective in removing dandruff and dust, and is durable and inexpensive.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

A mitten for horse-cleaning purposes woven from cords of horse-hair, substantially as shown and described.
