

## IMPROVEMENT IN ADJUSTABLE MIRRORS FOR DRESSING-CASES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 191,720, dated June 5, 1877; application filed November 16, 1876.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, SAMUEL R. SCOTTRON, of New York, in the county of New York, and in the State of New York, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Adjustable Mirrors for Dressing-Cases; and do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to the letters of reference marked thereon, making a part of this specification.

The nature of my invention consists in a bureau or dressing case having hinged doors, in which are arranged mirrors hung upon pivots opposite each other, to be adjusted at any angle desired, as will be hereinafter more fully set forth.

In order to enable others skilled in the art to which my invention appertains to make and use the same, I will now proceed to describe its construction and operation, referring to the annexed drawing, which represents a perspective view of a dressing-case embodying my invention.

A represents a dressing-case or bureau of any suitable construction, and provided with the usual hinged doors BB. These doors, in my invention, are simply frames, in each of which is hung a mirror, C, upon central pivots, so that it can be adjusted at any angle desired, and either the glass or the back can be turned to the outside.

These mirrors being thus adjustable, and by means of the motions obtainable by swinging them on their hinges horizontally, and on a pivot or axis vertically, a person may obtain any view of himself by reason of the angles at which each mirror may be placed with reference to the other.

Having thus fully described my invention, what I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

A bureau or dressing-case, A, having two hinged skeleton frames, B B, into each of which is pivoted a mirror, C, capable of being placed at any augle, and capable of being revolved on the pivots, so that the mirrors can face on either side of the frame, substantially as and for the purposes herein set forth.
