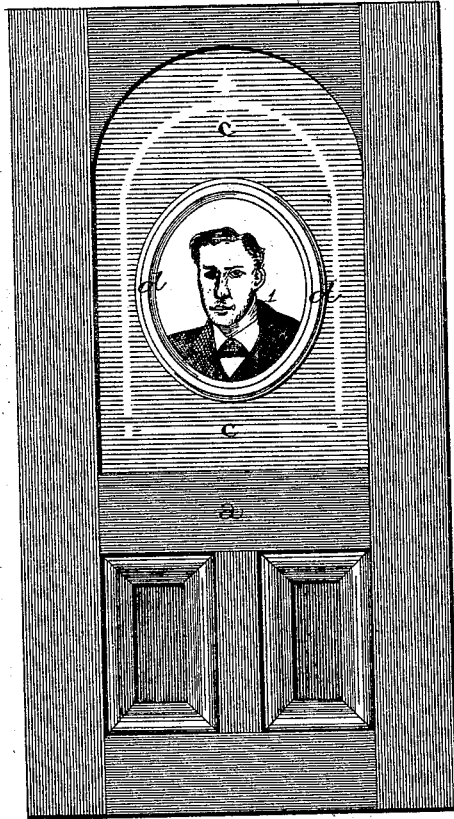
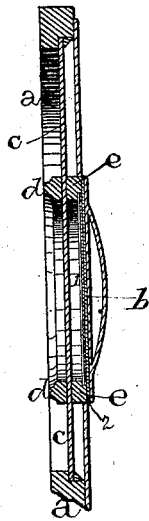

IMPROVEMENT IN MOUNTING PICTURES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. **197,936**, dated December 11, 1877; application filed September 29, 1877.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOHN W. JUNKER, of Pittsburg, in the county of Allegheny and State of Pennsylvania, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Picture-Frames; and I do hereby declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, such as will enable others skilled in the art to which it pertains to make and use it, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, which form part of this specification.

My invention relates to an improvement in picture-frames; and it consists in affixing frames for portraits or pictures, and especially photographs, upon the glass panels of doors, book-cases, or other glass surfaces, as will be more fully described hereinafter.

The accompanying drawing represents my invention.

a represents a door, provided with the glass panel *c*. Stuck to this panel, by means of any suitable cement, is a suitably-shaped frame, *d*, through which the picture is to show. Secured to the inner side of the panel, immediately under the frame *d*, is another similarly-shaped frame, *e*, which is also held in place by means of cement. In the inner edges of the frame *e* is formed a shoulder, in which is placed the

photograph or other picture 1, and over the back of this picture is placed a sheet of rubber, leather, or other soft material, 2, and then over both of these is securely clamped the metallic cover *b*. By means of the soft material 2 and cover *b* the picture is kept perfectly airtight.

By the above-described method of securing pictures to glass panels, it will be seen that no hole is made through the glass, and that when it is desired to remove the picture, all of the parts above described can be taken away without any injury or disfiguration of the glass.

Having thus described my invention, I claim—

The combination of the door *a*, having a glass panel, *c*, frames *d e*, secured to each side of the glass, picture to fit in the frame *e*, and backing to hold picture in position, substantially as shown.
