

IMPROVEMENT IN BEEFSTEAK-POUNDERS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 198,459, dated December 25, 1877; application filed November 30, 1877.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, EUGENE HILL and VANDORIUS I. THURSTON, both of Mogadore, in the county of Summit, in the State of Ohio, have invented a new and useful Beefsteak-Pounder; and we do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the same, reference being had to the annexed drawings, which are made a part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 is a longitudinal view, and Fig. 2 is an end view.

Like letters of reference represent similar

parts.

B B is the head, made of potters' clay, "slipped," of almost a cylindrical form, very slightly tapering up and outward, with spurs a a a a a a tregular intervals, as shown in Fig. 1. The spurs are made on, with, and of the material of which the head B B is made—that is to say, the head B B, with spurs attached, is to be made, in form and material substantially as above set forth, in a die or mold.

A A represent the handle attached to the head B B, said handle to be made of wood.

Fig. 2 represents the end of head, as above set forth, with spurs attached, as described. Ois an orifice extending longitudinally through the head B B, (the circle J representing the orifice at the handle end, and the circle H at the opposite end,) the orifice being of an almost cylindrical form, tapering very slightly upward and outward.

What we claim is—

The head BB, made of potters' clay, in form and substance substantially as set forth and described in the specification, to which a handle of wood may be attached.
