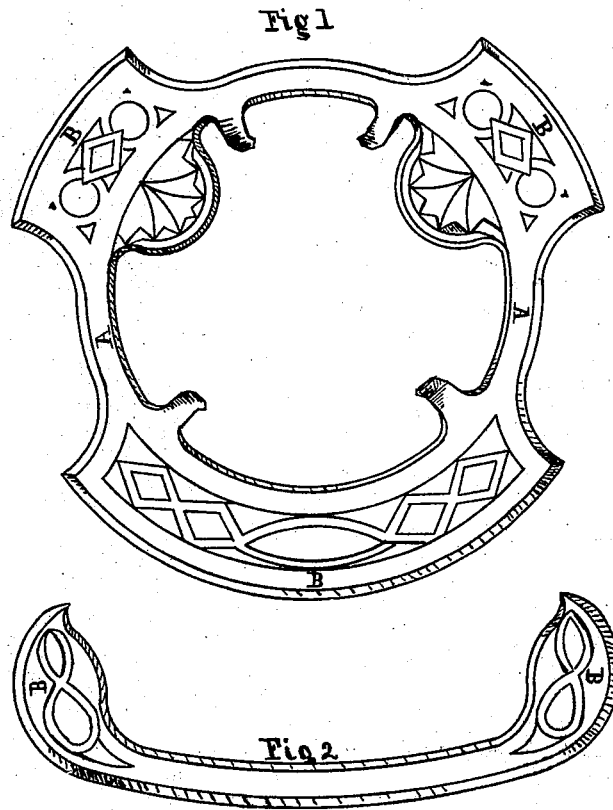

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IMPROVEMENT IN FOOT BARS AND RAILS FOR STOVES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. **209,053**, dated October 15, 1878; application filed
September 2, 1878.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOSIAH JEWETT, of the city of Buffalo, in the county of Erie and State of New York, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Foot Bars or Rails for Stoves, of which the following is a specification:

The nature and object of my invention consist in providing, as a useful adjunct to the ordinary foot bar or rail, a place or places, forming a portion or part of or made separate and bolted onto the said foot bar or rail, for the purposes of setting a vessel for heating water or articles of food, and for other useful purposes.

In the accompanying drawings, Figure 1 represents a foot-bar made to entirely encircle the base of a stove. Fig. 2 represents a foot-bar made to encircle only a portion of the circumference of a stove.

The letters B indicate the projections constructed for the purposes of accommodating a vessel or vessels.

I do not confine myself strictly to the manner shown of forming these projections, for they may be made a part of and cast with the foot-bar; or they may be made separate, and bolted or secured by catches to the foot-bar.

I am aware that prior to my invention an attachable rim, with sliding shelves for the purpose of accommodating vessels or dishes, and that swinging shelves so constructed that they may be moved so as to project beyond the hearth or bottom of a stove, in order to form a temporary platform for the accommodation of a dish or vessel, and when not in use moved under the hearth or bottom, are the subjects of Letters Patent at different times; but I am not aware that a foot bar or rail for a stove was ever before constructed or used with the projecting or widened sections, as described and shown in this specification and accompanying drawings.

What I claim is—

The combination, with the foot-bar A, of the flat ornamental surfaces B, projecting from the regular outline of the said bar, for the purposes described, and as herein fully set forth.
