


## IMPROVEMENT IN WINDOW-CORNICES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. **209,346**, dated October 29, 1878; application filed September 25, 1878.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, CHARLES LIPPE, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented certain novel and useful Improvements in Adjustable Cornices for Windows; and I hereby declare in what manner the same is to be constructed, arranged, and operated, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, which are lettered to correspond with and form a part of the specification.

To enable those skilled in the mechanic arts to construct, and the public to operate, the same, I will describe it as follows, to wit:

Figure 1 is a perspective view of the back of the cornice A, in order to show the arrangement of the adjusting screw-rod B, operating in the stationary nuts 1 and 2, which form a part of the plates 3 and 4.

C is an adjustable cap, operating by means of the clasps or hooks d d' passing over the top of the cornice A, and hooking into the groove s s at any suitable point.

Fig. 2 is a front view or face of Fig. 1. The novelty of my invention consists of an adjustable cornice, A, with an adjustable cap, C, to cover the opening C', Fig. 1, said cornice operating by means of a screw-rod, B, and nuts 1 and 2, to extend or contract the same to suit the different windows, by first sliding the cap C to either side of the opening C', so that the screw-rod B may be rotated to adjust the cornice A to any desired width.

What I claim as novel and useful, and wish to protect by Letters Patent of the United States, is—

An adjustable cornice, A, with an adjustable cap, C, provided with any suitable clasps or hooks, d d', said cornice being adjusted by means of the screw-rod B and nuts 1 and 2, all arranged and operating in the manner and for the purpose set forth.
