

IMPROVEMENT IN SAD-IRONS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 160,068, dated February 23, 1875; application filed December 4, 1874.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, James M. Whiting, of the city and county of Providence, in the State of Rhode Island, have invented a new, useful, and Improved Sad-Iron; and I do declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the same, reference being had to the annexed drawings, making a part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 is the perspective view; Fig. 2, a lateral view of the shoe to which the iron is attached. Fig. 3 is the end view, and Fig. 4

the point of the shoe.

In Fig. 1, a represents a cast-iron handle, and b b b b four steel springs, which enter the handle a in close proximity to each other, and diverge to the point of their entering the irons c c, constituting a spring sufficient to hold the shoe E firmly while in use. D represents the

horizontal center-piece of the shoe E, as seen in Fig. 2, which is clasped by the irons $e\,e$ and held by the springs, as above described.

The irons $c\bar{c}$ being pressed onto said centerpiece, the iron is detached from the shoe by pressing on the heel of the same and raising the toe, as seen in Fig. 2.

What I claim as new, and desire to secure

by Letters Patent, is-

The iron c c, divided in two parts horizontally, from heel to point, the steel springs b b, and the handle a, the horizontal centerpiece D, formed on the shoe E, combined substantially as and for the purposes described.
