DESIGN FOR WORK-STAND.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,161**, dated February 23, 1875; application filed January 25, 1875.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, MATTHEW S. DUNN, of the city of Rochester, in the county of Monroe and State of New York, have invented a new and original Design for Ladies' Work-Stands; and do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the same, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration.

My improvement relates to an ordinary work-stand, consisting of a basket or receptacle, *a*, standards *b b*, platform *c*, and legs *d d*. These parts are of the usual form.

I erect upon the top of the basket or receptacle four standards, *ffff*, and secure upon these a circular body, *g*, with a plain top, *k*. I also place on the platform *c*, beneath the basket, an ornament, *h*, which consists of a turned standard or base, *i*, and circular rim *l* in the form of a vase, with a convex top, *m*.

The body *g* and the ornament *h*, resting respectively above and below the basket, constitute my improvement, and present an ornamental and attractive appearance by relieving the stiff and monotonous form of the basket when used alone. The body *g* covers and relieves the top of the basket, while the ornament *h* fills the open space between the platform and bottom of the basket.

What I claim as new is—

The design for work-stands, substantially as described, and illustrated in the accompanying drawing.
