DESIGN FOR STATUARY.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,182**, dated March 2, 1875; application filed February 11, 1875.

[Term of Patent 14 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOHN ROGERS, of the city of New York, N. Y., have invented a Design for a piece of Statuary, of which the following is a specification:

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustrations.

Its name is "Hide and Seek," and it is intended as a companion-piece to a former design called "Hide and Seek—Whoop."

My present design represents a boy standing with his back toward the trunk of a tree. He rests on his left foot. His jacket is thrown

over his right shoulder, and in his left hand he holds his cap, which he has moved from before his face as he hears the call of "whoop." The vase on the trunk of the tree has ornaments on opposite sides of a girl's head looking out from a circular orifice, which is surrounded on the sides with shells.

What I claim as my invention is-

A design for a piece of statuary, as described and shown.
