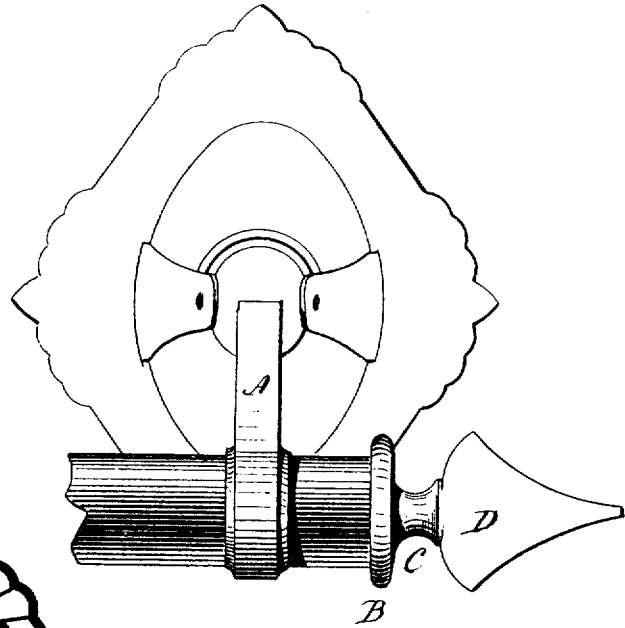
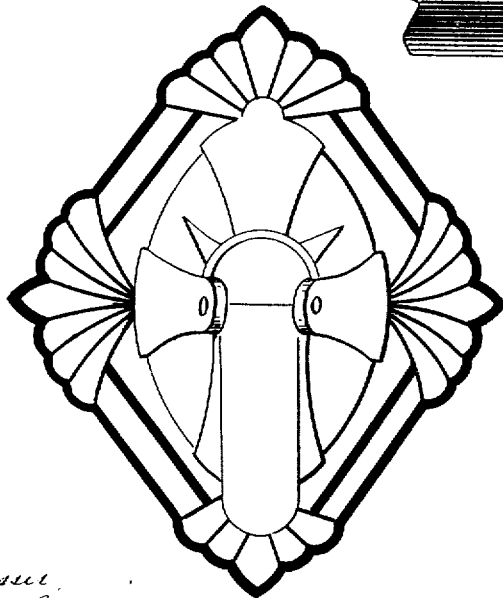

DESIGN FOR COFFIN-HANDLES.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,199**, dated March 9, 1875; application filed February 25, 1875.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM M. SMITH, of West Meriden, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Coffin-Handle; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent, in—

Figure 1, front view of one socket, with the lever and part of the bar; Fig. 2, front view of the socket only.

This invention relates to a design for that class of lifting-handles commonly called coffin-handles, and particularly to the parts termed the "socket" and "tips;" and the design consists in the peculiar configuration of the said parts, as hereinafter described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.

The base of the socket is of diamond-shape

in outline, the angles finished with a fan-shaped ornament, as shown. The center is raised to form the socket proper, to receive and hold the lever A. The tip consists of a base, B, neck C, and flat spear-head shaped tip D, as shown.

The outline of the socket-base and the flat spear-head shaped tip constitute the peculiar characteristics of this design.

I claim—

1. The design for handle-socket, consisting of a diamond-shaped base with fan-shaped angle ornaments, substantially as described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.

2. The design for coffin-handle tip, consisting of the flat spear-head shaped end, as herein described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.
