DESIGN FOR EMBROIDERY-PATTERNS.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8,266, dated April 13, 1875; application filed April 7, 1875.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawing, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawing constitutes part of this specification, and represents a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated board; and it consists in the peculiar configuration and ornamentation of the motto, as shown in the accompanying illustration. The principal feature in this design is the word "Charity," the shape of the let-

ters composing this word being the peculiar characteristic of this design. The ornamentation consists of a ribbon-work, in which appropriate phrases are introduced; but it will be understood that the letters composing the word "Charity" constitute the chief element of the design, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim-

The design for embroidery-pattern herein described, consisting of the word "Charity," in form and ornamentation as shown in the accompanying illustration.
