

DESIGN FOR FANS.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8,307, dated May 4, 1875; application filed April 26, 1875. [Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, BERNARD HECHT, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a new and original Design for Fans, of which the following is a specification:

The design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, to which reference is made.

An eagle is represented with outspread wings, and as grasping a fasces and an olive-branch in its talons. The fasces rest upon a United States shield, which, in turn, lies upon six flag-staffs, which cross each other loosely, and the flags of which are festooned or folded loosely over the middle parts of the said staffs. The front flag upon one side is the United States flag as first adopted, and bears the figures 1776, and upon the other side the United States flag as it now is, and bears the figures 1876. The rear flag upon one side is

the Palmetto flag, and upon the other side the star flag. The intermediate flags upon both sides do not show sufficiently to be distinguished. The picture is semicircular in shape, and in each end part is shown a branch with leaves and fruit.

This design will be painted, printed, or otherwise formed upon the paper or other material that forms one or both sides of the fan.

I claim as my invention—
