

DESIGN FOR FANCY CASSIMERES.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,316**, dated May 11, 1875; application filed April 12, 1875. [Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, FREDERICK SNOW BOS-WORTH, of the city and county of Providence and State of Rhode Island, have invented a certain new and useful Design for Fancy Cassimere Fabrics; and I do hereby declare that the following specification, taken in connection with the drawings making a part of the same, is a full, clear, and exact description thereof.

The effect of my novel design will be apparent on an inspection of the accompanying drawings, to which reference is made. Said effect is produced by the arrangement of the diagonal and transverse bars, which are so placed upon the ground-work of the fabric as to appear in longitudinal, transverse, and diagonal stripes.

The diagonal bars A have a downward inclination toward the right, while the diagonal bars C have a downward inclination toward the left. The diagonal bars A and C alternate with the transverse bars B, to form both longitudinal and transverse stripes, but the bars A and C do not appear in the same stripes running either lengthwise or crosswise of the fabric. Longitudinal and transverse stripes, composed of bars A and B, alternate, respectively, with stripes composed of bars C and B. The diagonal stripes have a different composition, the transverse bars B forming one series of stripes, while the diagonal bars A and C, in alternation, form another series, the stripes of the latter series being arranged in alternation with those of the former.

The design may be placed upon a ground of plain or fancy weaving, and may be made in any preferred variety of colors for producing a desirable effect.

What I claim is—

The design for fancy cassimere fabrics, substantially as described and shown in the drawings.
