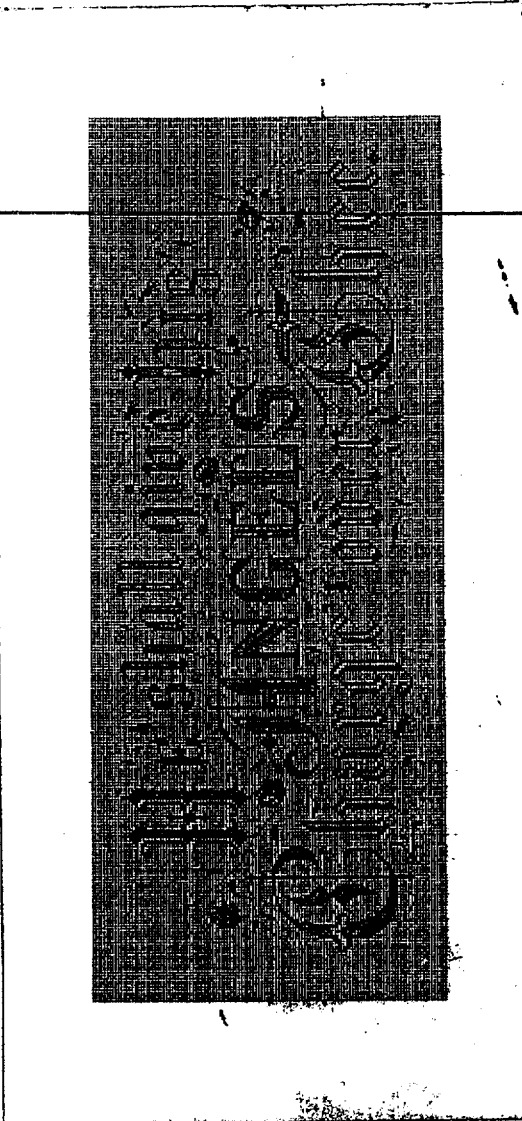

To all whom it may concern :

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated card-board, the pattern to be printed upon the board, so as to give a general indication for the form of the letters and ornamenting tracery.

The design consists in the configuration of the letters composing the motto and the ornamentation, as shown in the accompanying illustration, and hereinafter described.

The motto constituting the principal part of this design is, "He shall give His angels charge over thee."

The words are arranged in serpentine lines, the capitals forming the chief characteristic of the design. Interwoven with the words is an ornamental tracery of vine-work, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim—

The design for embroidery-pattern herein described, consisting of the motto, "He shall give His angels charge over thee," in form as shown in the accompanying illustration.
