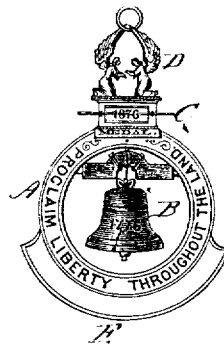
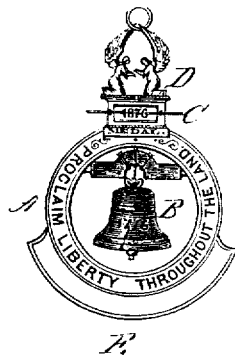

## DESIGN FOR A CHARM-MEDAL.

Specification forming part of Design No. **S,331**, dated May 18, 1875; application filed April 28, 1875.  
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, CHRISTIAN H. HERSHEY, of Philadelphia, in the county of Philadelphia and State of Pennsylvania, have invented a certain new and useful Design for Medal-Charms; and I do hereby declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, such as will enable others skilled in the art to which it pertains to make and use it, reference being had to the accompanying print, which forms a part of this specification, in which—

Figure I is a face view of the design.

My design is made up of several parts, as follows: First, a circle or disk on, which is shown the words "Proclaim Liberty throughout the Land;" second, within the circle just mentioned is a counterpart or flat fac-simile of a bell bearing the figures "1776," and showing a crack similar to that in the Old Liberty Bell in the State-house at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; third, surmounting the circle is a representation of the "Ark of the Covenant,"

on which rest two angels, the tips of whose wings meet.

A in the accompanying drawing shows the circle; B, the bell; C, the ark of the covenant, and D the angels. E shows a blank, on which the owner's name may be impressed. On the side of the ark the figures "1876" are made to appear.

What I claim is—

1. The design for a charm-medal composed of the circle A, bell B, and ark C, substantially as shown and described.

2. The design for a charm-medal composed of the circle A, bell B, ark C, and piece E, substantially as shown in the accompanying illustration.
