DESIGN FOR SILK FABRICS.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,358**, dated June 1, 1875; application filed April 30, 1875.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOSEPH COIGNET, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a new and original Design for Silk Fabric, of which the following is a specification:

The nature of my design is fully shown in the accompanying specimen, to which reference is made.

The design relates to silk cloth or other fabric used for ladies' ties, scarfs, &c.; and consists in the arrangement of four squares, having flowers in two diagonal squares, and leaves in the adjoining diagonal squares.

The design is made of four squares, with alternating blocks or strips of two different colors. Two diagonal squares are provided with raised (sergé) flowers on satin ground,

the flower of one square being of lighter color on dark ground, the other of dark color on light ground, and placed in opposite diagonal direction to each other. The other squares are made with leaves, having fringed frosted (callout) edges on taffeta or tabby ground, also placed in diagonal but opposite direction to each other in the squares.

This arrangement of four squares with flowers and leaves, is repeated throughout the whole fabric.

I claim as my invention—

The design for silk cloth herein described and shown.
