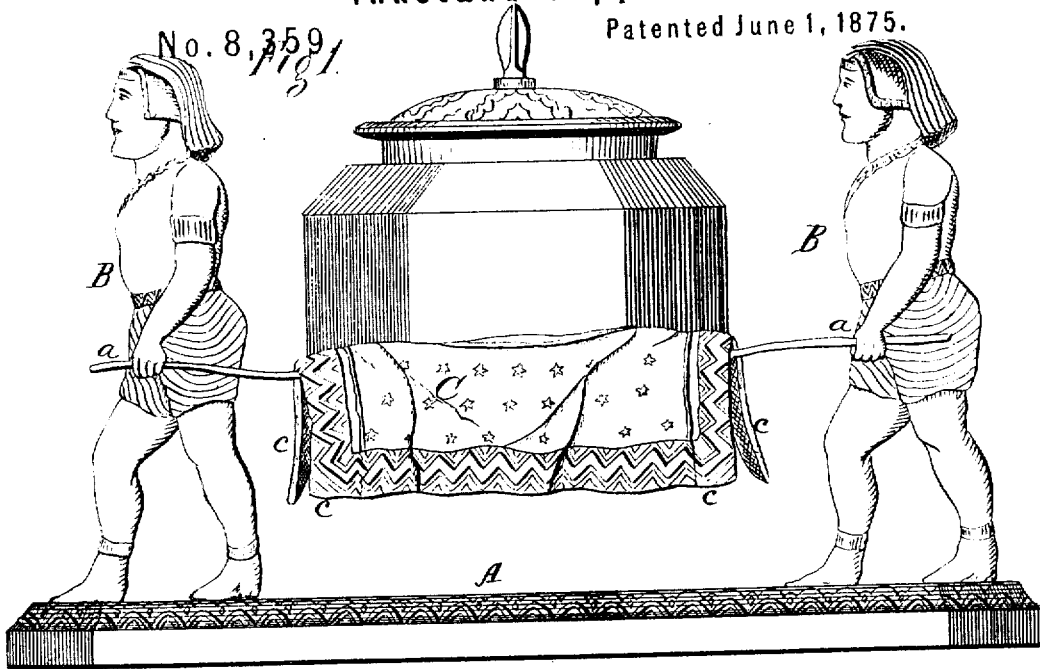
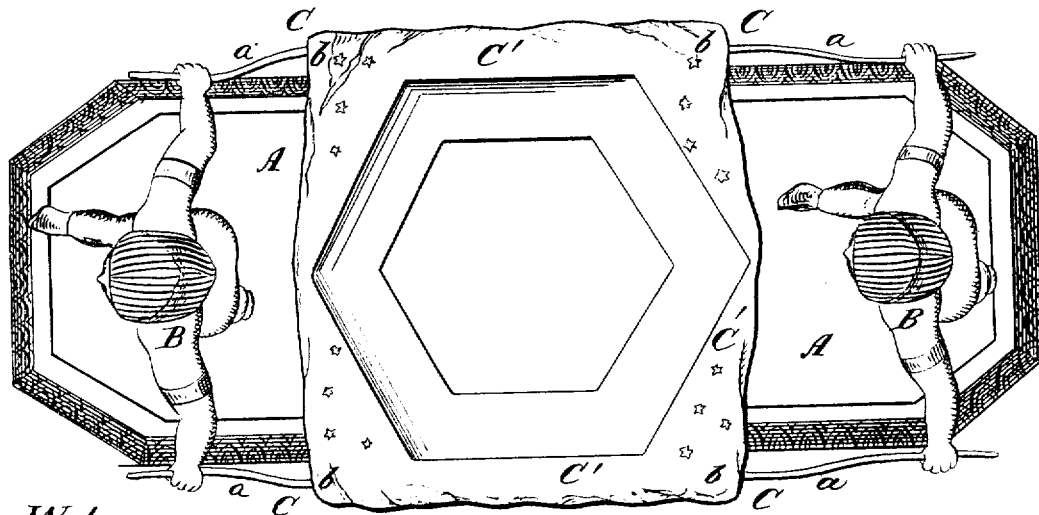

DESIGN FOR INKSTAND-SUPPORTS.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,359**, dated June 1, 1875; application filed May 14, 1875.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

CASE A.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, CHARLES KITSCHIELT, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a Design for Supports for Inkstands, of which the following is a specification:

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying drawings, to which reference is made, and in which—

Figure 1 is a side, and Fig. 2 a plan, view representing my design aforesaid.

A is the base, at each end of which is a miniature human figure, B, the hands of these miniature figures grasping the poles *a* of a miniature stretcher or palanquin, C, the central portion C' of which has the form of a mat, rug, or fabric, drawn from one pole to the other, horizontal at *b*, but drooping or falling

to a vertical position at the four sides of said central portion C, as shown at *c*, the inkstand D being placed upon the horizontal portion B.

It is intended to make this design in bronze or other suitable metal or solid material.

What I claim as my invention is—

The design for an inkstand-support, comprising the miniature human figures B, represented as upon the base A and supporting the stretcher or palanquin C, the whole having the contour and configuration substantially as herein set forth.
