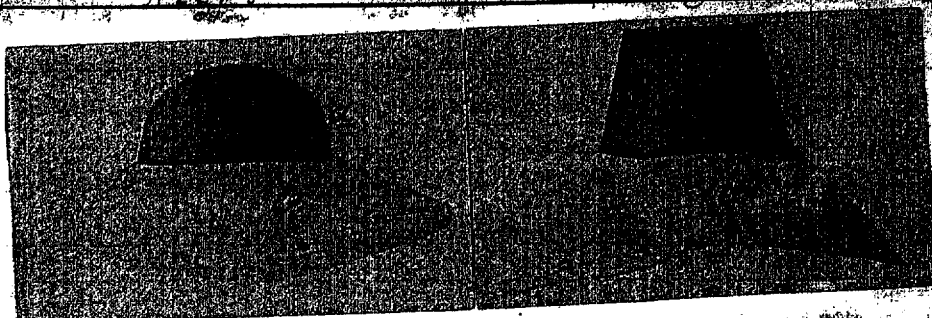
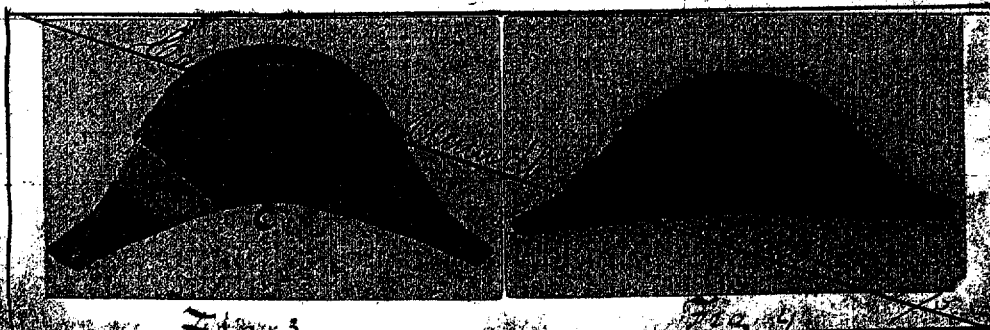

DESIGN FOR CHAPEAU-BLOCK.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,386**, dated June 15, 1875; application filed February 1, 1873.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, THOMAS AGENS and JOHN C. POST, of Newark, in the county of Essex and State of New Jersey, have invented a Design for an Improved Chapeau-Block, of which the following is a specification:

Our invention consists in the form of the chapeau-block, as shown.

Figure 1 is a side view of the block. Fig. 2 is an end view of the same.

The form is thus explained: The tapering crown *a* has a semicircular top, *c*, and the order of this top will be understood by reference to the two figures. The crown rests upon a drooping fan-board, *b*, which, as seen in Fig.

1, from front to back, is much more elongated than from side to side, as seen in Fig. 2, and the angle of the sides of the fan-board, as seen in Fig. 2, is much more obtuse than the angle shown in Fig. 1.

We claim—

The design of chapeau-block, having the tapering crown *a* and semicircular top *c*, and drooping fan-board *b*, as shown and described.
