DESIGN FOR EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,412**, dated June 22, 1875; application filed June 11, 1875.

CASE EE.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated board, designed to indicate the portion of the surface to be covered by embroidery. It consists in the peculiar configuration of the letters, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

The motto constituting this design is "Nearer, my God, to Thee," the last three words arranged in a line below the first. The peculiar form of the principal letters constitutes the chief characteristic of this design. Surrounding the motto is an irregular or ornamental line, and within which floriated tracery is interwoven with the letters, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim—

The design for embroidery-pattern herein described, composed of the motto "Nearer, my God, to Thee," in form as shown in the accompanying illustration.
