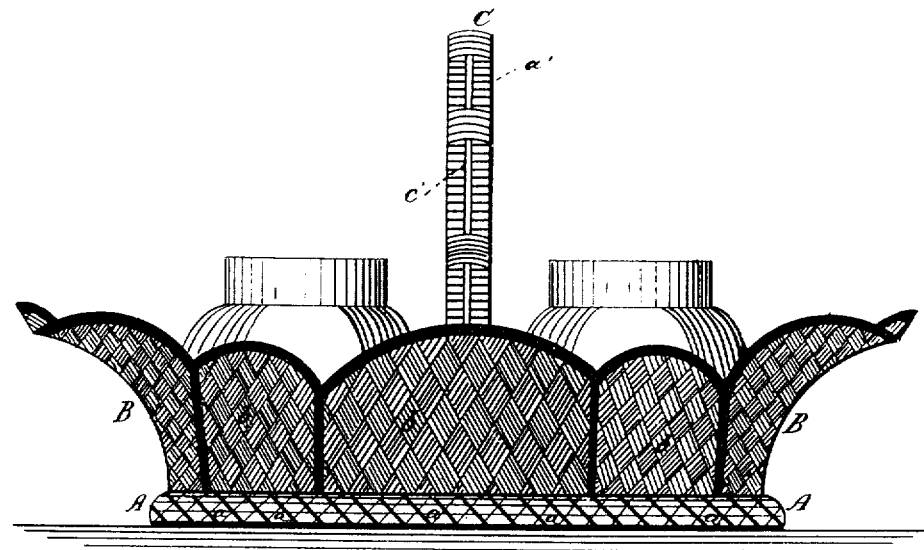
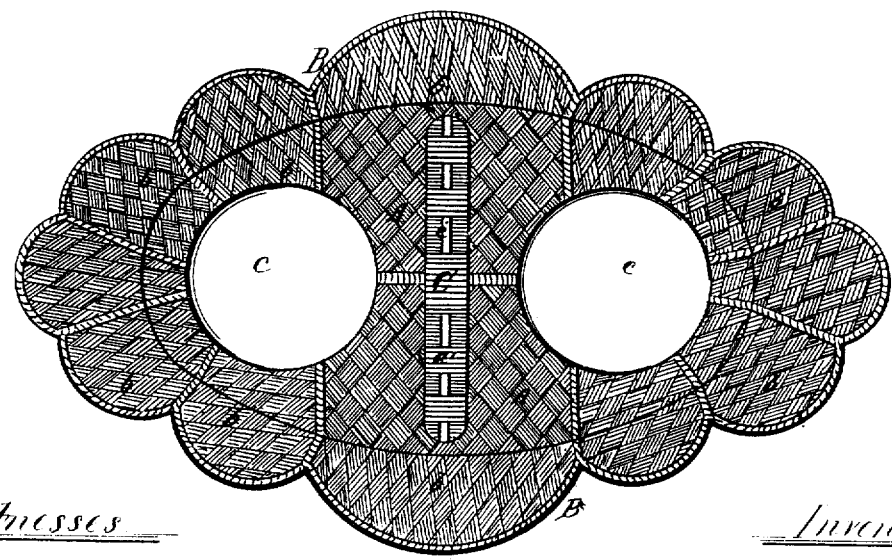

DESIGN FOR INKSTAND-SUPPORTS.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8,555, dated August 3, 1875; application filed June 22, 1875.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

CASE F.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, CHARLES KITSCHOLT, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a Design for Inkstand-Supports, of which the following is a specification:

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying drawings, to which reference is made, and in which Figure 1 is a side, and Fig. 2 a plan, view, representing my design aforesaid.

The base A projects outward from the circumference of the adjoining portion of the sides B, and is cross-hatched by diagonal ribs a. The sides B flare outward, and are divided into panels b, each of which is curved or more or less arched or semicircular at its upper edge, as shown more fully in Fig. 1. The inner and outer surfaces of each panel are formed with alternating diamond-shaped spaces, each ribbed with corrugations running at right angles to its adjoining spaces, in imitation of woven willow-work. The interior of the support is, as it were, dish-shaped, and in the

bottom, near each end, is a circular depression, as indicated at c in Fig. 2. At the center is an upwardly-projecting bow, C, arching over the parts hereinbefore described from side to side, and which is ornamented with transverse corrugations a', and central longitudinal rib c.

It will be seen from the foregoing description, and from the drawings aforesaid, that the inkstand-support formed according to my design has, in general, the configuration of a low basket with flaring sides, or circumference more or less scolloped at its upper or outer edge. I propose to make this design in bronze or other metal or hard material.

What I claim as my invention is—

The design for an inkstand-support, having the contour of a low basket with flaring sides, and furnished with a transverse handle, substantially as shown and described.
