

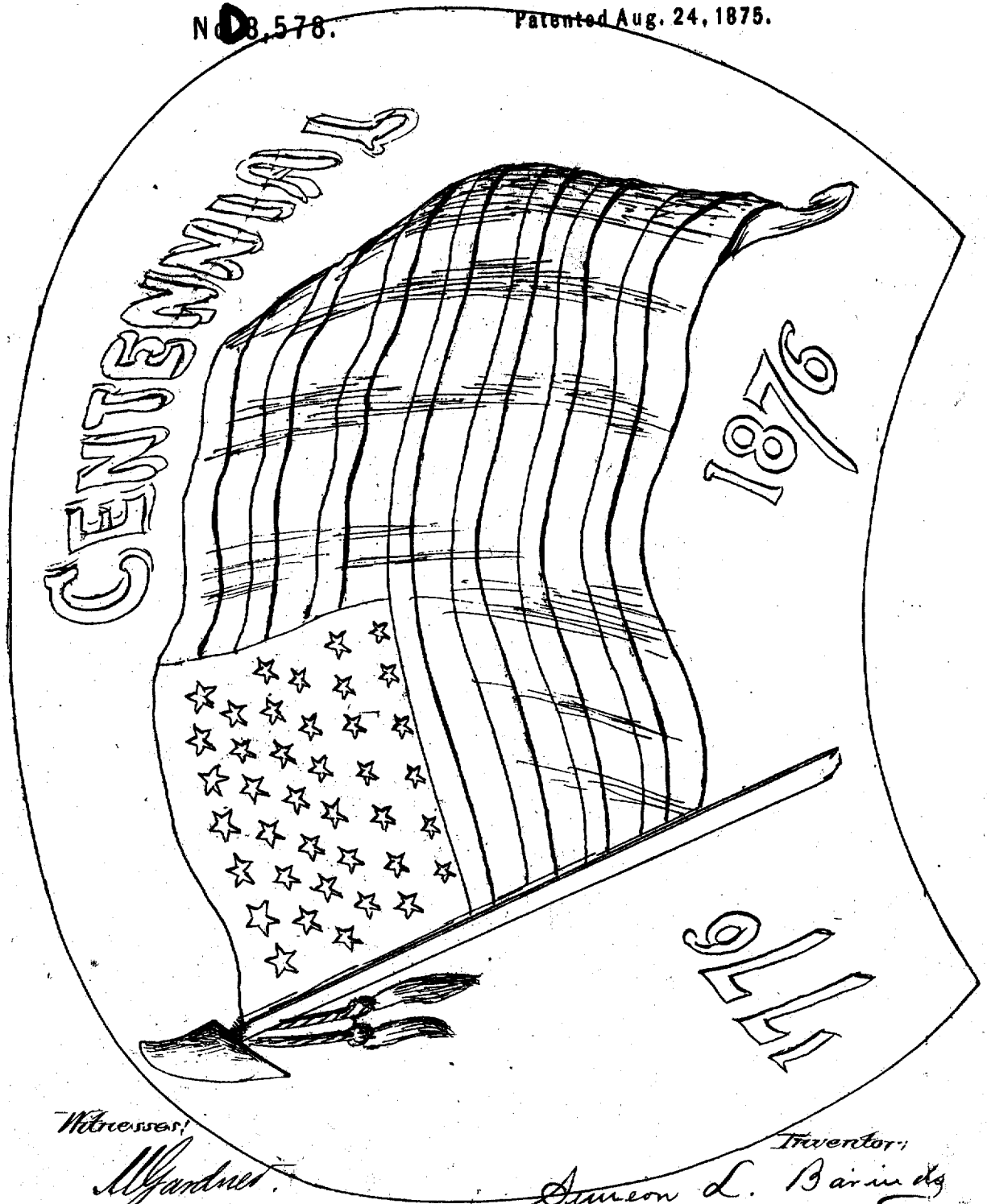

DESIGN FOR A FAN.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8,578, dated August 24, 1875; application filed August 20, 1875.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

CASE A.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, SIMEON L. BARINDS, of the city of Memphis, county of Shelby and State of Tennessee, have invented a new and original Design for a Fan, of which the following is a specification:

The design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, to which reference is made.

A large flag of the United States, in colors as it now is, is represented on one side of the fan floating from a pole, which is crowned with a red cap, and to which pole is attached two tassels. The word "Centennial" appears just above the flag, and the numbers 1776 and 1876 at the left and right bottom respectively.

The words and figures are preferably placed in semicircular form.

The design may be painted, printed, or otherwise formed upon the paper or other material that forms the fan.

I claim as my invention—

The design for a fan, composed essentially of the United States flag, pole, red cap, and tassels, grouped and arranged substantially as herein described and shown in the accompanying photographic illustration.
