

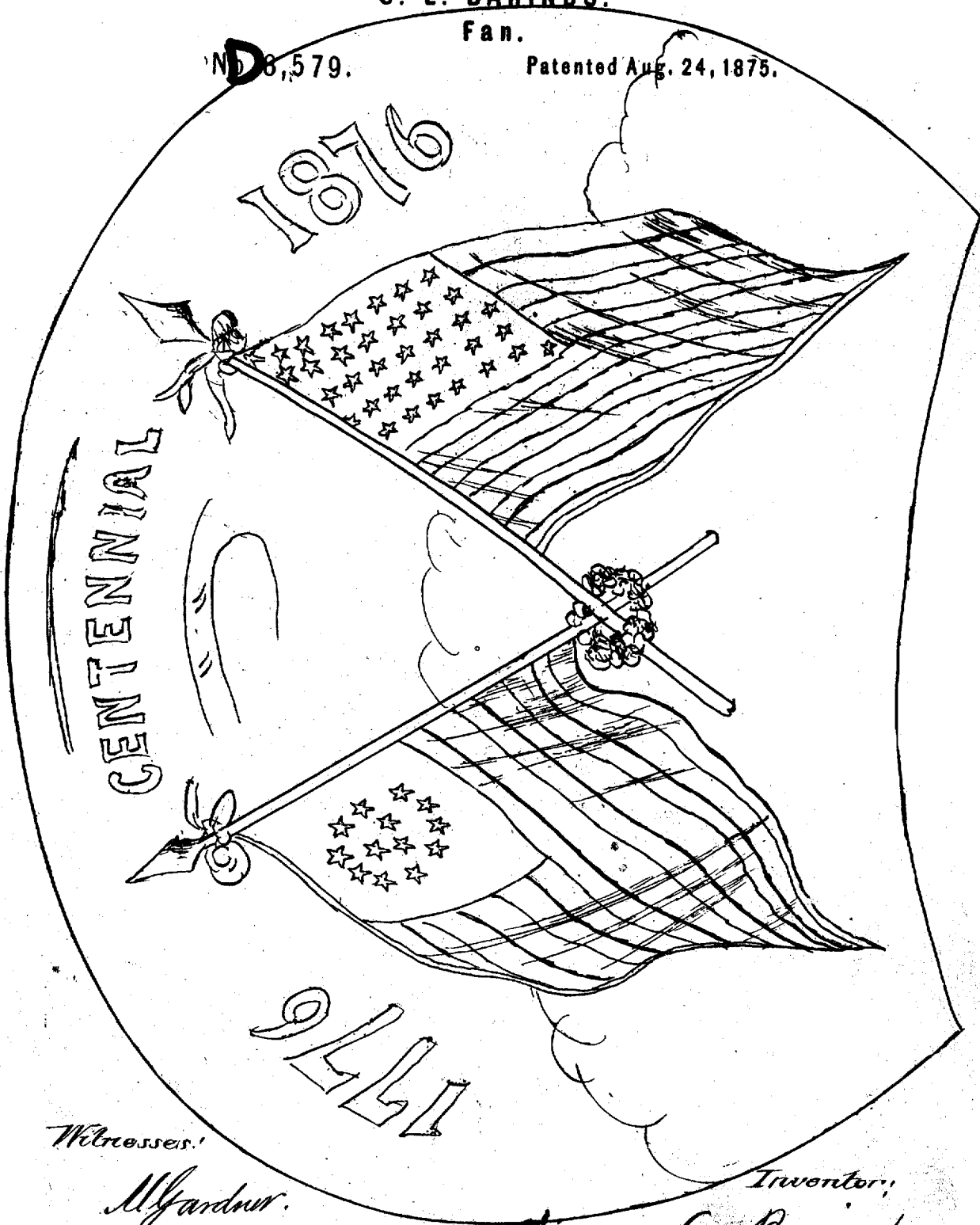

DESIGN FOR A FAN.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8,579, dated August 24, 1875; application filed August 20, 1875.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

CASE B.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, SIMEON L. BARINDS, of the city of Memphis, county of Shelby and State of Tennessee, have invented a new and original Design for a Fan, of which the following is a specification:

The design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, to which reference is made.

Two flags are represented on one side of the fan, crossing each other near the end of the poles to which the flags are attached. Encircling the poles where they cross each other is a wreath of olive branches. The flag on the left-hand side represents the United States flag as first adopted, and just above this flag are the figures "1776;" while the flag on the right represents the United States flag

as it now is, and just above this flag are the figures "1876." The words and figures are preferably placed in semicircular form, and just between the points of the two flags is shown the word "Centennial."

This design may be painted, printed, or otherwise formed upon the paper or other material that forms the fan.

I claim as my invention—

The design for a fan, composed essentially of the two flags crossed, grouped, and arranged substantially as herein described, and shown in the accompanying photographic illustration.
