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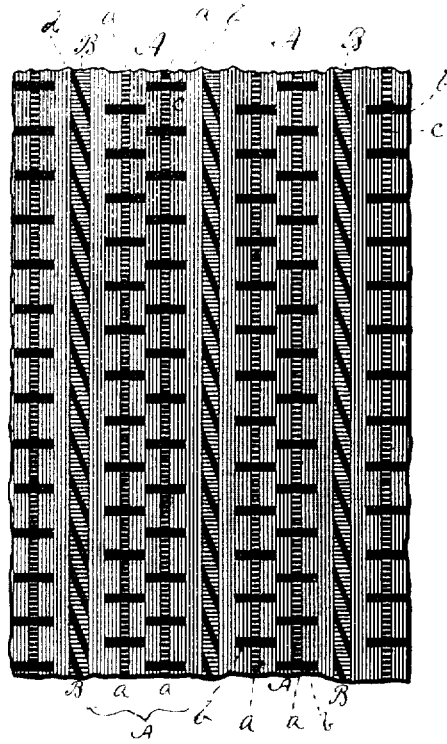

DESIGN FOR FANCY CASSIMERES.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,592**, dated August 31, 1875; application filed August 4, 1875.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM B. WEEDEN, of the city and county of Providence, in the State of Rhode Island, have invented a new and Improved Design for Fancy Cassimeres; and I do hereby declare that the following specification, taken in connection with the drawings making a part of the same, is a full, clear, and exact description thereof.

The new design which is the subject of this patent is produced by the combination of the peculiarly-composed broad and narrow stripes, hereinafter described, and shown in the drawing.

A A in the drawing represent broad stripes, which run lengthwise of the fabric, and are composed of plain weaving relieved by two lines of stripes, *a a*, which latter are severally made up of cross-bars *b*, connected by a spiral narrow corded or broken line, *c*, the cross-bars *b* of the two lines of stripes *a a* being arranged alternately with each other, and,

from the character of the weaving, giving the effect, through light and shade, of being raised above the plain ground of the body of the broad stripe A. In combination with the broad stripes A, and arranged alternately with them, are narrow stripes B B, which are composed of diagonal bars *d*, which produce the effect of a convoluted corded stripe in relief.

The design may be represented in any variety or combination of colors that may be preferred for bringing out the effect which results from the combination of stripes thus composed.

What I claim as my invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The design for fancy cassimeres, substantially as described, and shown in the drawing.
