

DESIGN FOR A MEDAL.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8,647, dated September 14, 1875; application filed August 9, 1875.

[Term of Patent 34 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, WILLIAM B. CUNNING-HAM and PHILIP HILL, of the city and county of Philadelphia and State of Pennsylvania, have originated a Design for a Medal, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing making part of this specification.

The nature of our design is fully represented in the accompanying illustration, to which reference is made.

A represents the obverse and B the reverse of the medal. On the obverse is a perspective view of the art-gallery erected in commemoration of the one-hundredth anniversary of American independence, and the words "Centennial International Exhibition, Fairmount Park, Philadelphia, 1876." On the reverse is a perspective view of the main building, and above the same is the American eagle, with flags, arrows, olive-leaf, and scroll, the latter

containing the words "E Pluribus Unum." Accompanying the figures on the reverse are the words "Main Building, International Exhibition, Fairmount Park, Philadelphia, 1876. Ground Floor, 872,320 Sq. Ft., 20.02 Acres. Length 1880 ft. Upper Floors, 63,688 Sq. Ft., 1.45 Acres. Width, 464 Ft."

What we claim as our invention is—

The design for a medal, having on one side a representation of the art-gallery, and on the reverse side a perspective view of the main building, both erected in the city of Philadelphia, in commemoration of the hundredth anniversary of American independence, substantially as described, and illustrated in the accompanying drawing.
