

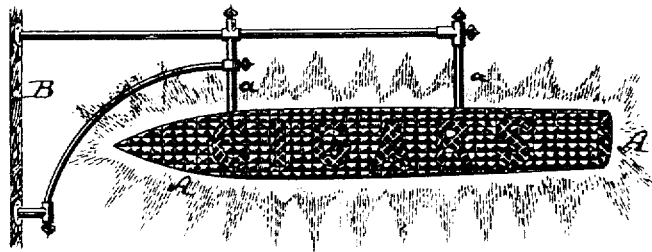

DESIGN FOR AN ILLUMINATING-SIGN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,669**, dated September 23, 1875; application filed September 17, 1875.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, FREDERICK McLEWEE, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a new and original Design for an Illuminating-Sign, of which the following is a specification:

This invention relates to that class of hollow signs, which are constructed of glass prism-heads, that are fastened to a wire frame; and the design consists in making such sign in the form of a cigar.

The accompanying drawing represents a side view of my design for an illuminating-sign.

The letter A represents the body of the

sign. The same is made in the form of a cigar, its surface being composed of glass-crystal or prism-heads of suitable color, as shown. The illuminating-sign A is suspended from a bracket, B, which is firmly fastened to a wall or other stationary support. I call this a design for an illuminating-sign, as it is the intention to light it at night from within.

I claim as my invention—

The design for an illuminating-sign, A, and bracket B, combined, as shown.
