

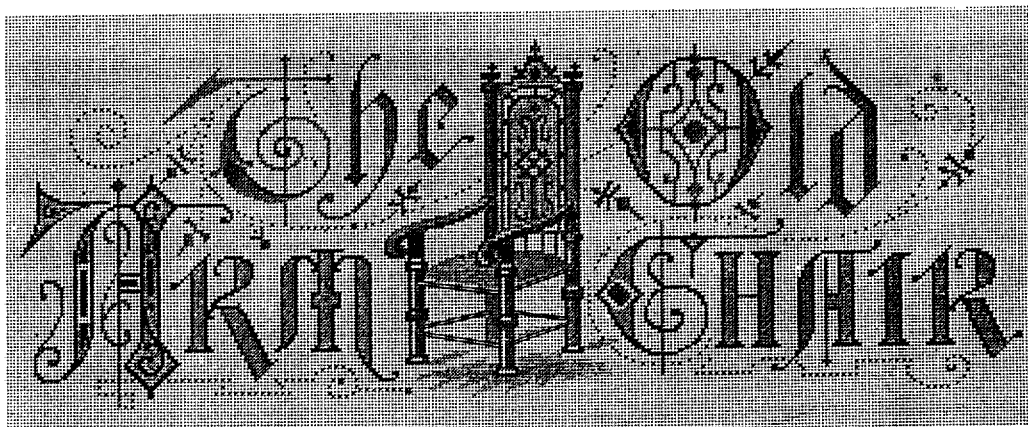

CASE II.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern II; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern, specially designed for perforated board, the object being to indicate the pattern to be followed in embroidering; and it consists in the peculiar configuration of the letters composing the motto and of the emblem.

The motto constituting the base of this design is "The Old Arm-Chair," the chief characteristic being the form of the letters rather than the arrangement of the words.

In the center there is a representation of an arm chair as an emblem of the motto. An ornamental tracery is interwoven, all as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim—

The design for an embroidery-pattern, herein described, consisting of the motto, "The Old Arm-Chair," in the form shown in the accompanying illustration.
