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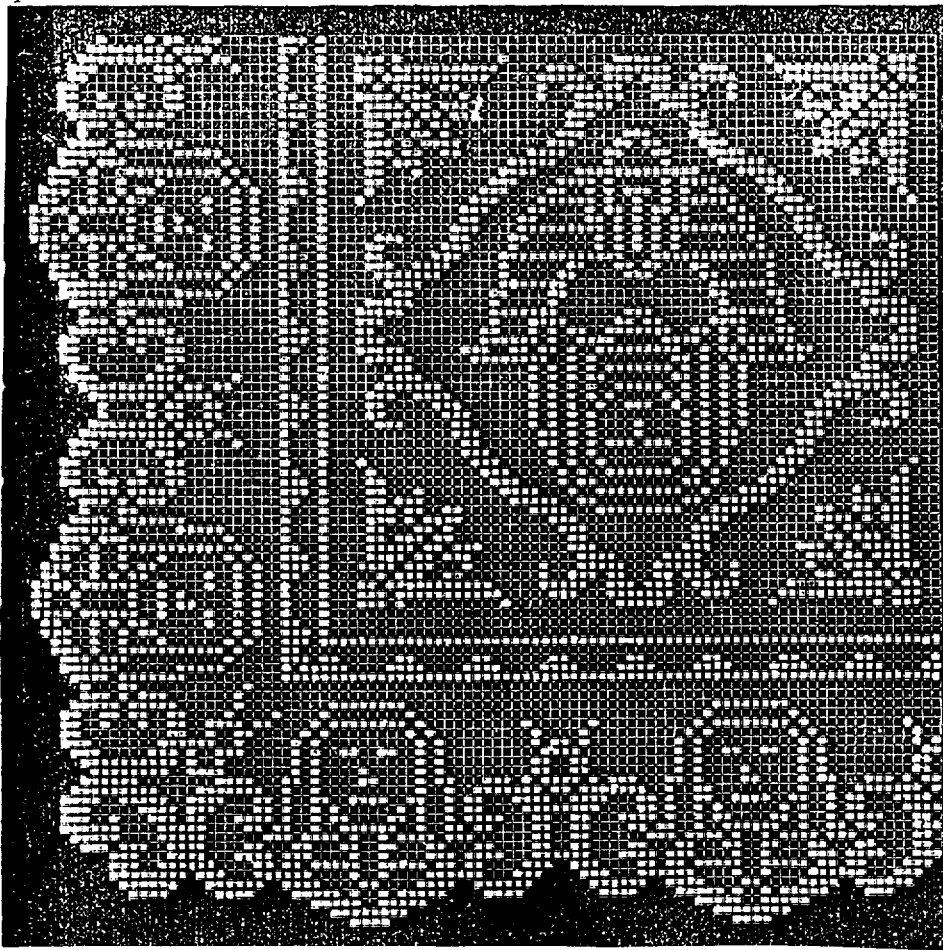

DESIGN FOR EMBROIDERY-PATTERNS.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM STEINHAUS, of New York, in the county of New York and State of New York, have originated and designed a Pattern-Chart for Crochet or Embroidery Work, of which the following is a full, clear and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying print, making a part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying printed illustration, to which reference is made.

The design is worked in squares, representing one quarter of a tidy; and consists of a body and a border. The body represents the head and bust of a sphynx in a wavy frame, opposite each of whose sides, in the corners, are bell-shaped ornaments, one in each corner. A double line, with pyramids resting on the outer line, separates the body from the border.

The border consists of lace-fringing, with figures of small sphynxes connected with one another by grotesque ornaments.

The design may be worked on an increased scale within an increased number of squares.

I reserve the right to transpose the positions of the sphynxes, to increase or diminish their number; also to paint the body and the border in different colors for embroidery-work.

I claim—

The design for embroidery-pattern, consisting of a representation of a sphynx-bust and Egyptian ornaments, with a border of lace-fringing, as above described, and illustrated by accompanying print.
