

DESIGN FOR EMBROIDERY-PATTERNS.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8,750, dated October 26,1875; application filed September 20, 1875.

[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM STEINHAUS, of New York, in the county of New York and State of New York, have originated or designed a Pattern-Chart for Crochet or Embroidery Work, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying print making part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying printed illustration,

to which reference is made.

The design is for embroidery-pattern, and consists of a representation of German-text letters G to M, inclusive, and laces A and B. Lace A is a plain narrow strip, with nine arches extending outwardly. Lace B is large and richly ornamented. From the top of the border are pendent flower garlands; below is a parallel pendent chain of separate rings, and

beneath this is a separate chain of detached medallion-shaped figures. The bottom of the lace is irregularly finished. The laces can be worked any length desired.

The design may be worked on a larger scale within an increased number of squares.

I reserve the right to reverse the figures in lace B, and to increase or diminish the number of ornaments.

I claim-

The design for embroidery-pattern, consisting of representation of German-text letters G to M, inclusive, the plain lace A, and the large lace B, with parallel chains of flowers, garlands, and medallions, as above described, and illustrated by accompanying print.
