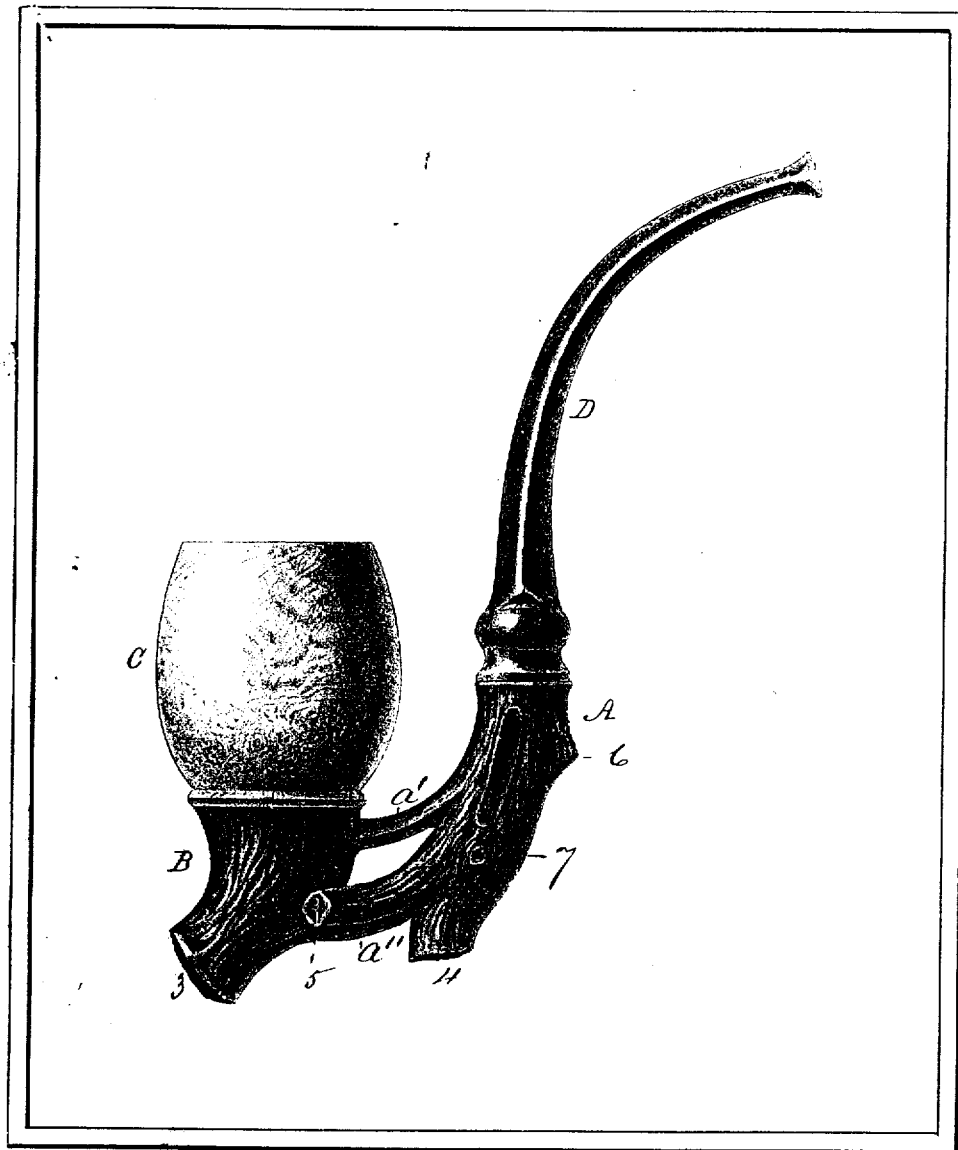

## DESIGN FOR TOBACCO-PIPE.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,777**, dated November 9, 1875; application filed October 25, 1875.  
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that we, LEONHARD NAX and FRANZ ALBERT KÜHN, of the city of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, have originated and designed a Pattern for Tobacco-Pipes, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration, making part of this specification.

The nature of our design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, to which reference is made.

A B represent the two main portions or body of the pipe, connected together by tie-roots *a' a''*, and supporting the bowl C and stem D. Both of the two sides of the body A B are alike in form and feature, and are intended to represent a transversely cut-off section of the main stem and branches of the tortuous and knotty roots of a tree, with the ad-

hering striated bark of said root and branches, 3, 4, and 5 being the cut-off portions remaining, and 7 and 8 the knots on the portion A, as represented in the illustration.

The bowl C and stem D are of the ordinary form or contour, and therefore we do not claim them.

The distinctive character of our design is found in the body A and B, with its connections *a' a''*, branches 3 4 5, knots 6 and 7, and striated bark adhering to the same.

What we claim as our invention is—

The design for a tobacco-pipe shown and described.
