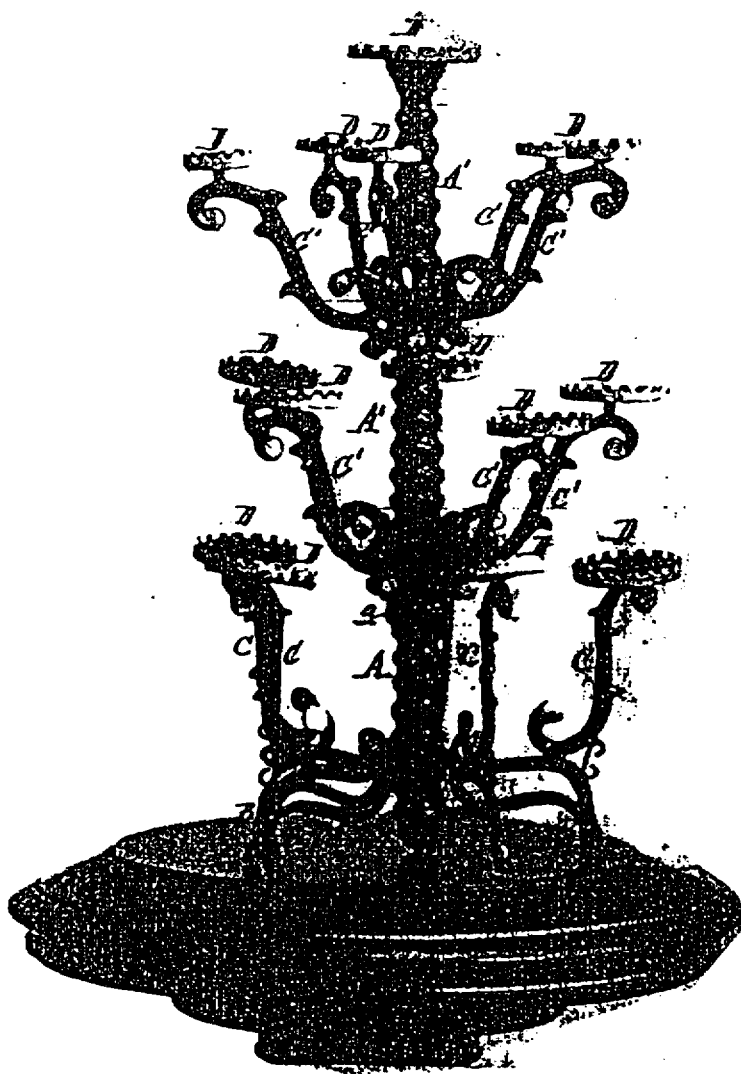

DESIGN FOR FLOWER-STANDS.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,783**, dated November 9, 1875; application filed October 9, 1875.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, HENRY P. ROBERTS, of De Ruyter, in the county of Madison and State of New York, have originated and designed a Flower-Stand, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the annexed photographic illustration making part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration.

A represents the lower part of a central standard, supported by curved metal feet B, radiating from it. A' is a continuation of the standard A, in the top of which it is pivoted at *a*. From the top of each foot B springs an ornamental bracket, C, to the top of which a flanged plate, D, is pivoted to receive and support a flower-pot. C' are radial brackets

springing from the upper part of the standard, each carrying a plate, D, the standard itself being surmounted with one.

The pot-supporting plates can be turned, each on its axis, while the upper standard, with its two rows of pot-supporters, can be turned around as occasion may require.

The artistic configuration of the standard and its attachments are so plainly represented in the photographic illustration as to need no description.

What I claim as my invention is—

The design for a flower-stand, substantially as represented and described.
