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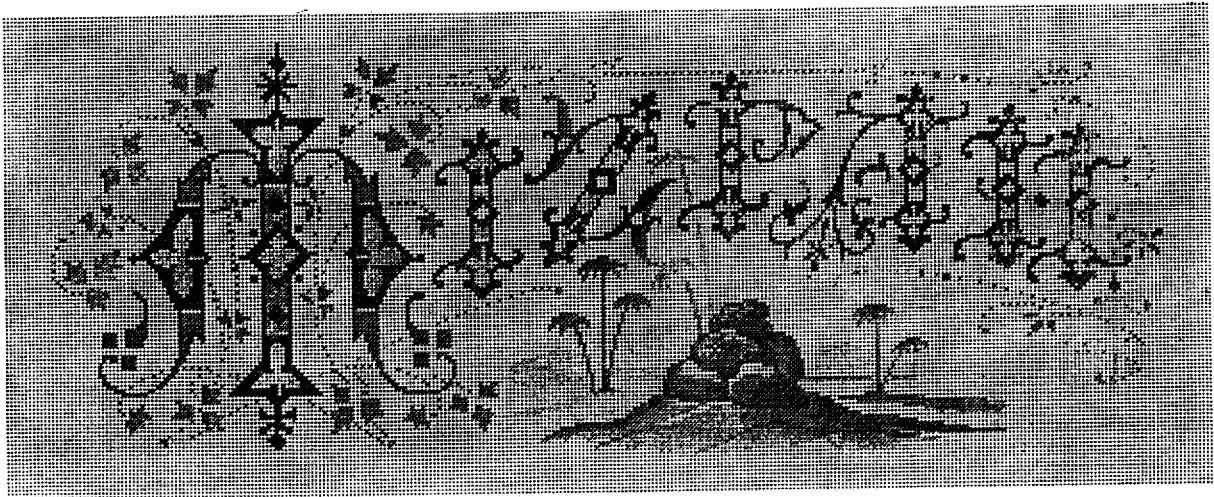

DESIGN FOR EMBROIDERY-PATTERNS.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,795**, dated November 16, 1875; application filed November 10, 1875.

To all whom it may concern :

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern specially designed for perforated board, the object being to indicate on the surface the pattern to be embroidered; and it consists in a representation of a monument of stones as the emblem, and the word "Mizpah" in connection therewith.

On the face of the pattern is a representation of a pile of stones, with tracery to give relief thereto, and on the same face the word "Mizpah."

This emblem or monument of stones constitutes the chief characteristic of the design, it only being essential that the word "Mizpah," in some form, shall be in the same pattern.

I claim—

The design for embroidery-pattern, consisting of the emblematical monument of stones, with the word "Mizpah," as described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.
