## DESIGN FOR LAWN-SETTEES.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,801**, dated November 23, 1875; application filed July 19, 1875.  
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, JOSEPH W. FISKE, of New York, in the county of New York and State of New York, have invented a Design for Lawn or Awning Settees, of which the following is a specification:

The nature of this design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, to which reference is made.

The design has more especial reference to the metal portions of the frame, the end pieces of which, as shown in the illustration, are made highly ornamental. These end pieces each have a central curved part, to which the back and seat slats are secured, and below this and between the legs are two curved braces united at the center, and terminating in an ornamental pendant, the spaces between the braces and the central curved part being occupied by a central circular ornament, from each side of which spring an ornamental scroll. The front and back sides of the frame are extended upward, and united at their top by a Gothic arch, terminating above in an ornamental socket for receiving the supporting bar or rod of the canopy, and having underneath three pendant ornaments, as shown in the illustration. There is also an arm-rest,

which curves gracefully forward underneath, and, resting on the central curved part, is turned upward, and terminates in three ornamental scrolls—one toward the front and the other two to the rear. The rods which support the canopy are also provided with an ornamental terminal projecting above the apex of the canopy, as shown.

I do not claim as my invention the design of a settee with a canopy broadly considered, as such have been made before, but not in the ornamental style here shown, the whole with the awning forming a graceful and ornamental design for a lawn-settee. In this case the seat is represented as made of wooden slats, but it may be of iron, if desired.

What I claim is—

A design for lawn-settee consisting of the frame, having arm-rests ornamented with scroll-work, and the awning-supports above the arm-rests, having the form of a Gothic arch ornamented with trefoil pendants, substantially as shown and described.
