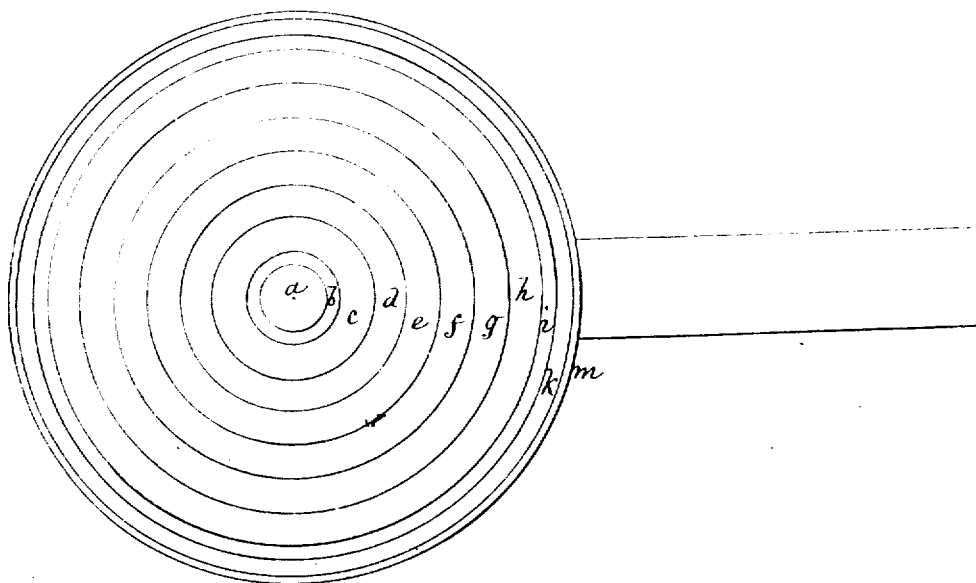
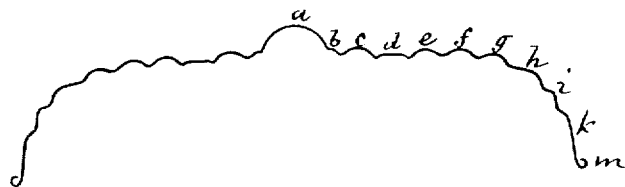

DESIGN FOR HAT AND BONNET HOLDERS FOR TRUNKS.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,803**, dated November 23, 1875; application filed November 10, 1875.
[Term of Patent $3\frac{1}{4}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOSEPH HALL, of the city of Newark, in the county of Essex and State of New Jersey, have invented an Improved Design for a Hat and Bonnet Holder for Trunks, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, making part of this specification.

The nature of my invention is fully represented in the accompanying drawing, to which reference is made.

Figure 1 represents a top view or plan of a hat and bonnet holder for trunks made in accordance with my improved design; and Fig. 2, a transverse section, showing a profile of the same.

Said holder has its center *a* of a convex button shape, or partially globular form, joined

at its base by an ovolo, *b*, which, as well as the several other ornamentations hereinafter described, is annular or endless. The ovolo *b* unites the center *a* with a bead, *c*, outside of or surrounding which latter is a flattened portion, *d*, and outside of this portion *d* a series of concentric beads, *e f g*, which are surrounded, in their turn, by an ovolo, *h*, below which is a bead, *i*, that is united at its bottom by a flat band, *k*, having a rounded molding, *m*, at its lower edge.

What I claim as my invention is—

A design for a hat and bonnet holder for trunks, substantially as described, and represented in the accompanying drawing.
