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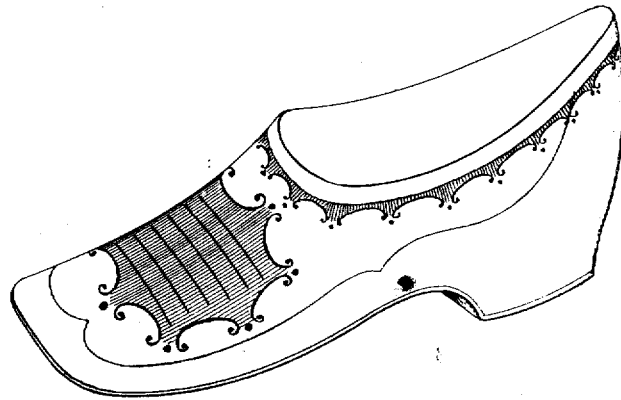

DESIGN FOR OVERSHOES.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8,810, dated November 23, 1875; application filed November 2, 1875.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern :

Be it known that I, GEORGE WATKINSON, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Overshoes; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a perspective view.

This invention relates to a design for overshoes; and it consists specially in the ornamentation of the instep, as shown in the accompanying illustration and hereinafter described.

On the instep is a space or figure formed of fine corrugations or ribs running longitudinally, with transverse ribs, distant from each other, to expose the said longitudinal corrugations or ribs between them. The outline of the surface thus ornamented may be somewhat varied from that shown in the illustration. Around the upper edge of the shoe there is a border of vertical ribs as the groundwork, and raised segmental lines and dots to indicate the outline of the border, all as shown in the accompanying illustration.

While it is the intention of this design to use the border and the instep ornament in the same shoe, as represented, it will be understood that either may be used without the other, or that the instep ornament may be used with a different border, or the border with a different instep ornament. I therefore do not confine this design to the combined use of the border and instep ornament.

I claim—

1. The herein-described design for overshoes, consisting of the corrugated surface and transverse ribs on the instep, combined with a border composed of vertical and segmental raised ribs and dots, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

2. The design for the instep of overshoes, consisting of the corrugated surface and transverse ribs, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

3. The design for border, consisting of the vertical ribbed surface, segmental raised ribs, and dots, as the outline of the said border, as shown in the accompanying illustration.
