DESIGN FOR EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,828**, dated December 30, 1875; application filed November 30, 1875.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

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To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern, (LL;) and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery pattern, intended specially for perforated board, the object being to indicate on the board the surface to be covered with embroidery.

The motto constituting the ground-work of this design is "No Place like Home"; and the invention consists in the peculiar form and

arrangement of the letters, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

The words "No Place" are in a segmental line above, with the word "Home" beneath, and the word "like" between.

The peculiar form of the capitals constitutes the chief characteristics of the design. The motto is ornamented by a tracery of vine-work, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim—

The design for embroidery pattern, herein described, consisting of the motto, "No Place like Home," in form as shown in the accompanying illustration.
