DESIGN FOR EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8,829, dated December 7, 1875; application filed November 30, 1875.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern, (K K;) and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated board, the object being to indicate on the board the portion or parts which are to be covered by embroidery to produce the pattern; and it consists in the words "No Cross, no Crown," combined with the emblem arranged as shown in the accompanying illustration.

The words "No Cross" are in a segmental line above; the word "Crown" below, with the word "no" between. The principal characteristic of this part of the design is the peculiar form of the capitals. In the word "Cross" the emblem of a united cross and crown is shown, and a vine-work or tracery, springing from the capitals, encircles and intertwines with the words, all as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim—

The design for embroidery-pattern herein described, consisting of the words "No Cross, no Crown," combined with the emblem of a united cross and crown, in form as shown in the accompanying illustration.
