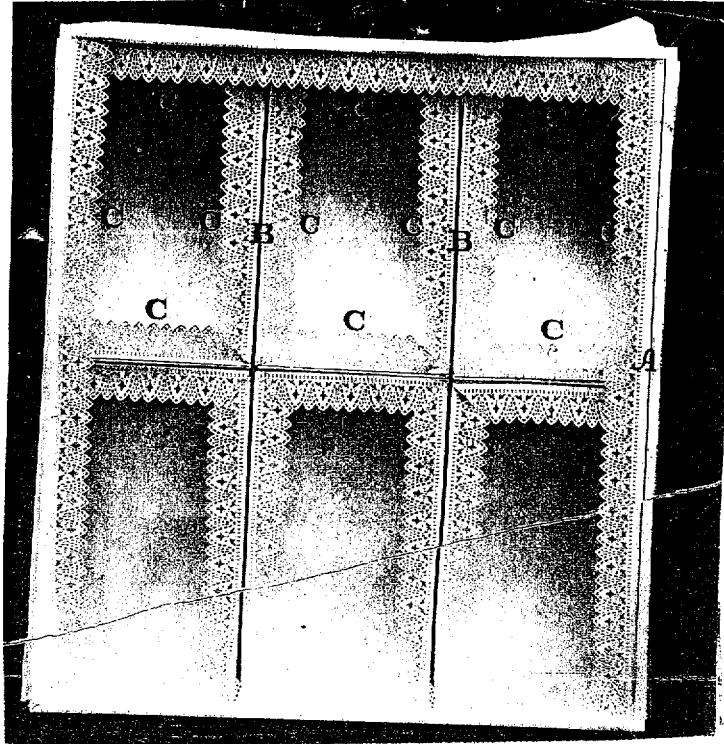

DESIGN FOR A PAPER BOX.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,845**, dated December 14, 1875; application filed March 13, 1875.
[Term of Patent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years]

To all whom it may concern :

Be it known that I, ISIDORE BIRGÉ, of the city and county of Philadelphia, and State of Pennsylvania, have invented a Design for Box for Artificial Flowers, of which the following is a specification :

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, to which reference is made.

A represents a box, in whose body is fitted divisional strips B, which are edged or finished with lace dies C, whereby there are formed a series of beautifully-ornamented compart-

ments, whose appearances greatly enhance the display of the flowers arranged in them.

What I claim as my invention is—

The new and ornamental design for a box for artificial flowers, the same consisting of a box having strips B and lace dies C, which surround each side of the inner faces of the divisions formed by the strips and body, as shown.
