

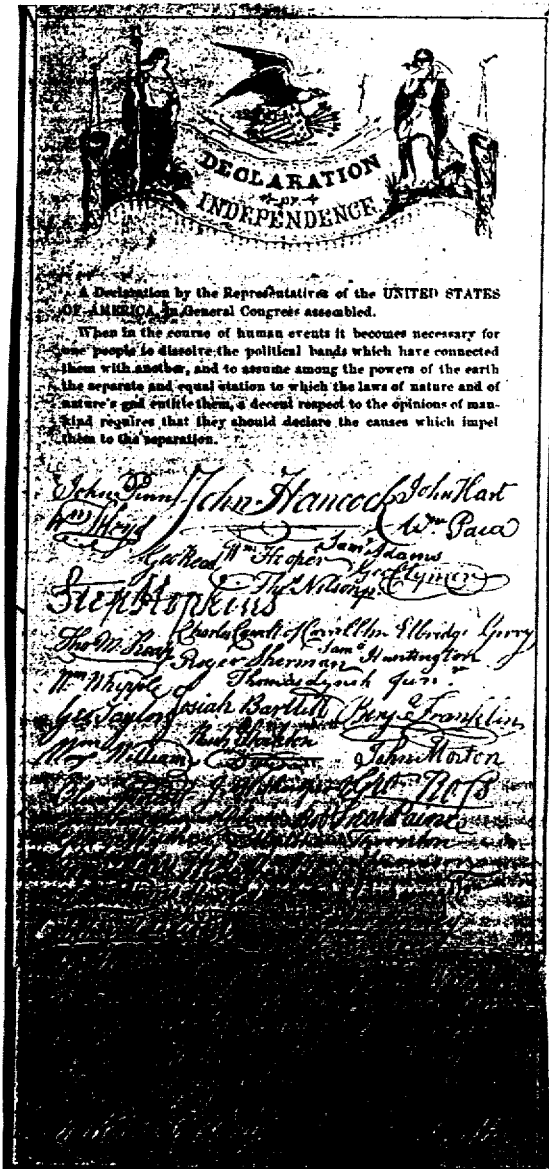

DESIGN FOR PRINTING OR WEAVING SILK OR OTHER FABRICS.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8,876, dated December 28, 1875; application filed December 15, 1875.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, STILES HUBER, of the city and county of Philadelphia, and State of Pennsylvania, have invented and produced a new and original Design for the Printing or Weaving of Silk or other Fabrics, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration, making part of this specification.

The relative proportions shown in said illustration are those which are specially adapted for the use of my design in book-markers or badges; but I wish it to be understood that I do not confine it to those, or to any specific dimensions or proportions.

In the accompanying photographic illustration, A represents the top part or heading of the design, and consists of a scroll containing the words "Declaration of Independence," and having at each end a standing female figure. One figure holds a staff surmounted by a liberty-cap, being intended to represent the Goddess of Liberty. The other figure has a bandage across its eyes, and holds a pair of

scales, being intended to represent Justice. Over the scroll, and between these female figures, is the figure of an eagle with wings extended, resting upon a shield, and holding a bundle of arrows and an olive-branch. This group of figures and scroll together make up the top part or heading of the design. Beneath this heading are the first sentences of the Declaration of Independence of the United States of America, in ordinary characters, as shown in the photographic illustration, and marked B, and beneath this, and forming the body or main part of the design, are the signatures, in fac-simile, of all the signers of the Declaration of Independence. (Marked C.)

What I claim, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The design or pattern consisting of the heading A and body C, substantially as shown and described.
