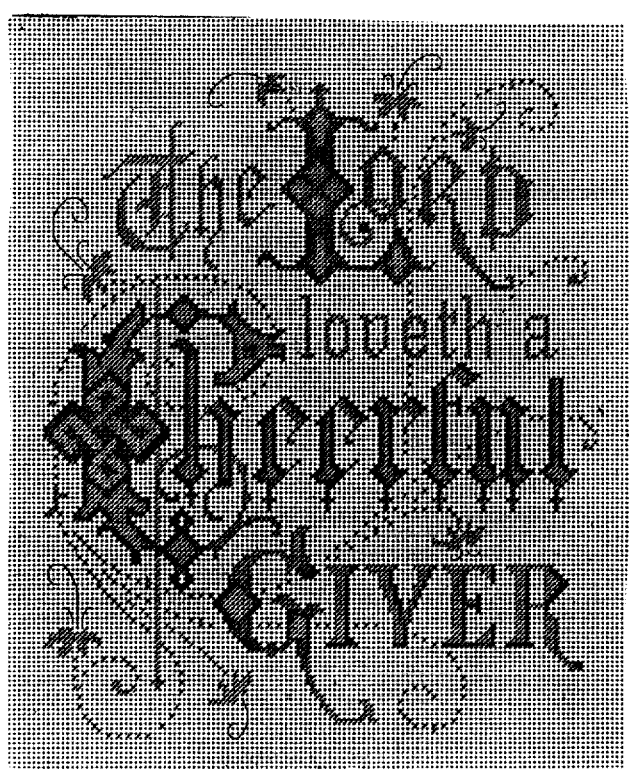

DESIGN FOR EMBROIDERY-PATTERNS.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,901**, dated January 11, 1876; application filed January 5, 1876.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated board, the object being to indicate on the surface the stitches to be taken or surface to be covered in working the pattern.

The motto which constitutes the base of the design is, "The Lord Loveth a Cheerful Giver."

The principal characteristics of the design are the capitals, as shown in the illustration.

The surface is ornamented by a tracery of scroll-work, and the words preferably arranged in the relation shown; but this relation may be changed without departing from the principal features of the design.

I claim—

The design for embroidery-pattern herein described, consisting of the motto "The Lord Loveth a Cheerful Giver," in form as shown in the accompanying illustration.
