DESIGN FOR EMBROIDERY-PATTERNS.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This-invention relates to a design for embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated board, the object being to indicate upon the surface of the board the stitches to be taken to represent the peculiar characteristics of the pattern; and it consists of the motto "Honor thy Father and thy Mother," in form as shown in the accompanying illustration. The words are arranged, "Honor"

at the top, "Father" as the center, and "Mother" below.

The principal characteristics of the design are the capitals and the letters of the word "Father." The words may be differently arranged without departing from the design. The pattern is ornamented by a tracery of scroll-work, as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim—

The design for embroidery-pattern herein described, consisting of the motto "Honor thy Father and thy Mother," in form as shown in the accompanying illustration.
