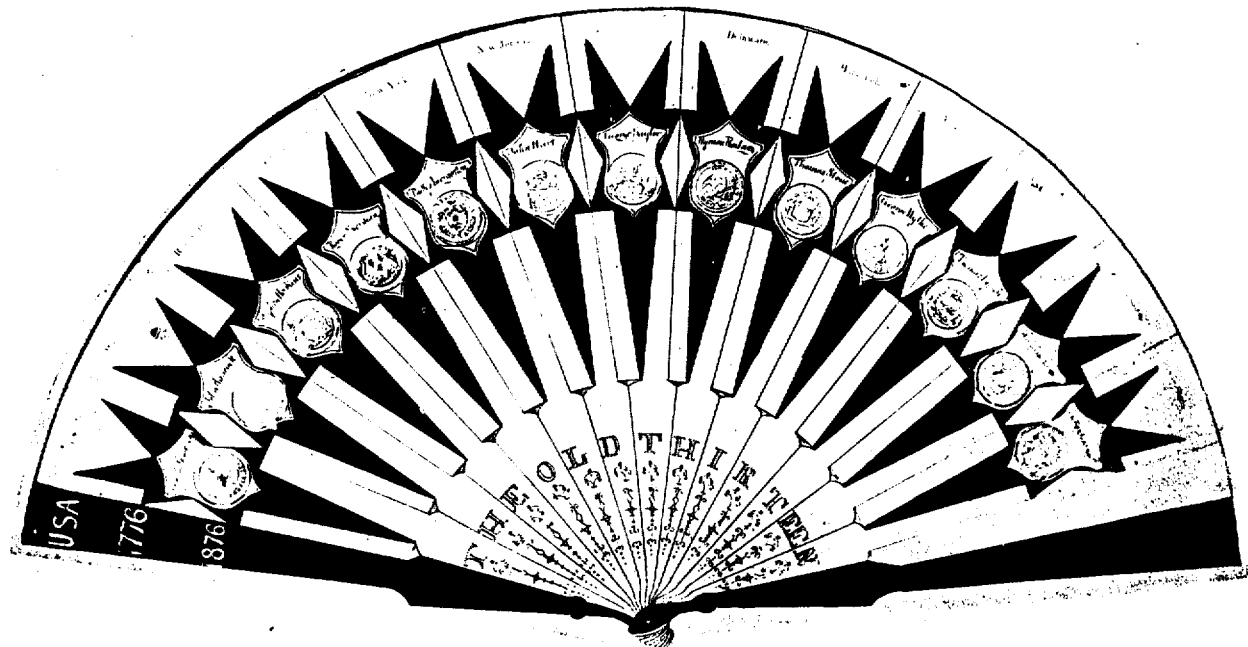

DESIGN FOR A FAN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,936**, dated February 1, 1876; application filed January 7, 1876.
[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Mrs. SARAH M. DUDLEY, of Detroit, in the county of Wayne and State of Michigan, have originated and designed a Pattern for Radially-Folding Fans, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration, making part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, to which reference is made, and in which is represented a radially-folding fan, the frame of which is made in the usual manner.

The frame is covered, in the ordinary way, with paper or fabric, upon which is printed, stamped, embossed, or painted the coat of arms, A, of the original thirteen Federal States, upon the lower end of a shield upon which, and above the coat of arms, is the name of one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence from the State or Colony whose coat of arms is shown upon the same shield. This shield, with its coat of arms and name, is placed near the center of an elongated star, and the name of each of said original States or Colonies may be printed above the star, shield, coat of arms, and name of said signer. Upon the outer face of the radial guard-arms B are shown the initial letters "U. S. A.", in monogram or plain, with the figures "1776" and "1876," and upon the other arms may be printed, so as to be disclosed when the fan is extended or opened, the words "The Old Thirteen."

What I claim as my invention is—

1. The design for a fan having the representations of the coats of arms of the original thirteen States or Colonies, substantially as shown in the accompanying illustration.

2. The design for a fan consisting of representations of the coats of arms of the original thirteen States, and a series of shields containing or showing the name of one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence upon each, as described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.

3. The design for a fan having a representation of a series of shields upon a series of elongated stars, as described, and shown in accompanying illustration.

4. The design for a fan consisting of a series of shields upon elongated stars, and having the names of the original thirteen States or Colonies, as described and shown.

5. The design for a fan having a representation of shields and stars and the words "The Old Thirteen," as described and shown.

6. The design for a fan consisting of a representation of a series of elongated stars, coats of arms and shields, and the figures and ornamentations, as described, and shown in accompanying illustration.
