

DESIGN FOR A LOCKET.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8,937, dated February 1, 1876; application filed December 30, 1875.

[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, GEORGE W. GILL, of the city and county of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, have originated and designed a Centennial Locket, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photograhic illustration, making part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration,

to which reference is made.

A, on one side of the locket, represents the original State House in Philadelphia, having the date 1776; and B, on the other side of the locket, represents Memorial Hall, one of the Centennial buildings, with the date 1876, the two buildings in connection, and the dates, in-

dicating the first century succeeding the declaration of our national independence.

What I claim as my invention is-

1. The design for a locket, having on one side the representation of the original State House of Philadelphia, with the date 1776, substantially as described and shown.
