DESIGN FOR A BADGE.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8,938, dated February 1, 1876; application filed January 7, 1876.

[Term of Patent 34 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOHN F. NAULTY, of the city and county of Philadelphia, and State of Pennsylvania, have originated and designed an Ornament or Badge to be carried upon the person during this centennial year and exhibition, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing and photographic illustration, making part of this specification.

The nature of my design is clearly shown in the accompanying illustration, to which reference is made.

A represents a drawing of the main portion of the badge, which may be composed or made of silk, woolen, or any woven fabric. Upon the face of the badge are three parallel lines or stripes, B C D—B red, C white, and D blue—representing our national colors. The top of the badge is a representation of a spread-eagle, while the bottom or lower part is in form of a bell, F. Across the said par-

allel lines or stripes of red, white, and blue are printed the figures "1776," on the top. In the middle is "Liberty and Union," and underneath, figures "1876," the whole combined to form a new, neat, and ornamental badge, designed to be worn during the coming celebration of our nation's centennial anniversary.

While I prefer making the stripes or parallel lines of red, white, and blue, as aforesaid, I do not consider the colors selected and described as an essential element in my design.

I claim-

The design for a badge, composed of the triple stripes B C D, surmounted by a spreadeagle, and terminated below by the bell F, substantially as shown and described.
