LEONHARD NAX, OF PHILADELPHIA, PENNSYLVANIA.

DESIGN FOR TOBACCO-PIPES.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8,940, dated February 1, 1876; application filed January 18, 1876.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, LEONHARD NAX, of the city of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, have originated and designed a Pattern for a Tobacco-Pipe, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photolithographic illustration or drawing, making part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photolithographic illustration or drawing, to which reference is made.

D represents the tobacco holder or bowl; E, the body, and F the stem.

The holder D is externally in the form of the middle frustum of a spheroid, and rests, by one of its ends, upon the broader end of the body E.

The body E is of the ordinary curved form, with the addition thereto of a spheroidal han-

dle, *e'*, and the bass-relief ornamentations *e''* *e'''* on the under portion and sides.

The stem F is of the ordinary curved form, and extends upward from the upper end of the body E in the usual manner.

I prefer to make the holder or bowl D of wood, and the body E and stem F of gutta-percha or hard rubber of a dark or black color; but I do not consider the materials and color of said parts to be essential elements in my design; and I do not claim them.

What I claim as my invention is—

A design for a tobacco-pipe, in which the body E is ornamented with the bass-reliefs *e''* *e'''*, and the projecting handle *e'*, substantially as described and shown.
