DESIGN FOR TOBACCO-PIPES.

Specification forming part of Design No. 8.941, dated February 1, 1876; application filed January 18, 1876.

[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, LEONHARD NAX, of the city of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, have originated and designed a Pattern for a Tobacco-Pipe, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photolithographic illustration or drawing, making a part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photolithographic illustration or drawing, to which reference is made.

G represents the tobacco holder or bowl, and H the supporting-body and stem in one piece. The holder or bowl G is of the common form, and rests upon the broader end of the body and stem. The body and stem H consist of one piece, curved and extended in a lateral direction from the bowl G, as shown.

On the upper side of the said body and stem H an anchor and chain, h' h'', are shown in bas-relief.

I prefer to make the bowl G of wood, and the body and stem H of gutta-percha or hard rubber of a dark or black color; but I do not consider the materials and color of said parts to be essential elements in my design, and I do not claim them.

What I claim as my invention is-

A design for a tobacco-pipe, in which the body and stem H are ornamented with the bas-relief anchor and chain h' h'', substantially as described and shown.
