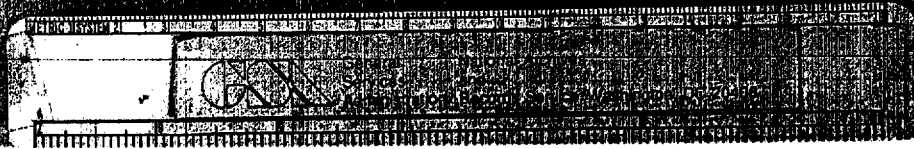

DESIGN FOR TEA-SET.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,951**, dated February 1, 1876; application filed January 15, 1876.
[Term of Patent 7 years]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM C. BEATTIE, of Taunton, in the county of Bristol and State of Massachusetts, have invented a new and useful Design for Tea-Set, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration, making part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, in which A represents the body of one of the vessels of the set, having a rounded bottom and supported upon legs. B B represent horizontal wreaths of flowers, which have a plain border, the said wreath being either engraved or wrought in bas-relief upon the otherwise plain body A. C is an urn or vase, which surmounts the lid, so as to afford a means for raising the same. Said vase contains a bunch of flowers, *a*, in high relief, and is also decorated with a wreath, *b*, in bas-relief, extending from one to the other of the handles. D are the legs, which have scroll feet, *c*, turning outwardly, each leg being ornamented by a bunch of flowers, *d*, in bas-relief, at the point where they join the rounded bottom of the vessel.

E is the spout, which is ornamented in relief with flowers and vines, *e*, and joins the vessel near its rounded bottom, so as to give to the lower part of the body, in connection

with the legs, the appearance of a quadruped. F is the handle, which is made with an angular bend at the top, of increased transverse dimensions, resembling the wish-bone of a fowl, the two branches of the handle being ornamented with flowering vines, *f*, in relief, which are tied around the same.

What I claim is—

1. A design for a tea-set, in which the plain body of the vessel is provided with one or more horizontal wreaths of flowers, B.
2. The lid, ornamented with a vase, C, filled with flowers *a* in relief, and surrounded by wreath *b*.
3. The legs D, having scroll feet *c*, and each ornamented with a small bunch of flowers, *d*, in relief, at the point where they join the body of the vessel.
4. The spout E, ornamented with flowering vines *e* in relief, tied around the same and attached to the lower rounded portion of the vessel, in the manner and for the purpose described.
5. The handle F, having an angular bend of increased thickness at the top, with its two branches tied around with flowering vines *f* in relief.
