DESIGN FOR AN EMBROIDERY-PATTERN.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,013**, dated February 22, 1876; application filed January 31, 1876.
[Term of Patent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMIL CRISAND, of New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Embroidery-Pattern; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent a face view.

This invention relates to a design for an embroidery-pattern, with special reference to perforated board, the object being a delineation of the figure to be wrought on the board as a guide for the embroidery; and it consists in the emblem of a cock, as indicative of a morning call.

The figure of a cock occupies the central portion of the pattern, with the words "Good Morning" as the motto; but other words of the same significance may be employed, the cock being the chief feature of the design, but having combined with it words indicating a morning salutation.

I claim—

The design for embroidery-pattern, consisting of a representation of a cock as the emblem, with words "Good Morning" as the motto, as shown and described.
