

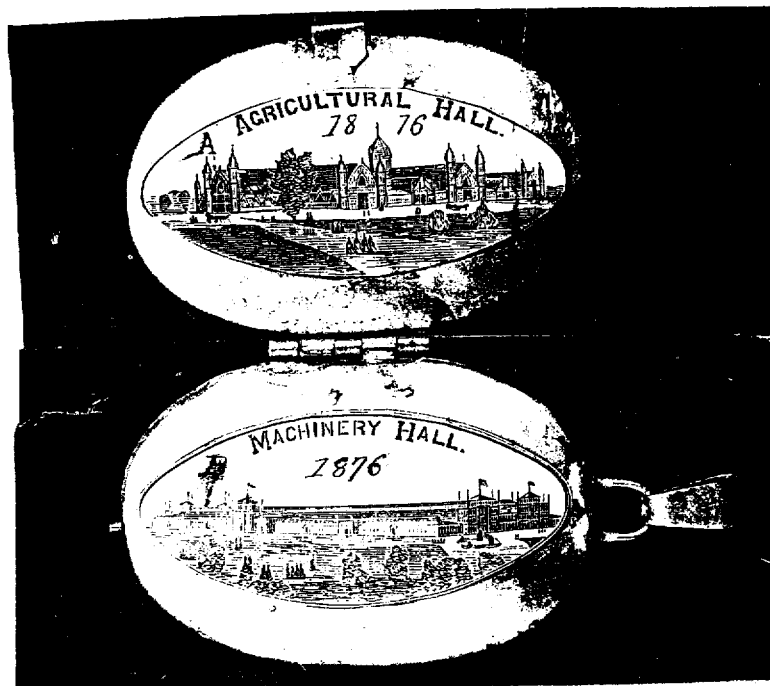

DESIGN FOR A LOCKET.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,106**, dated February 22, 1876; application filed January 24, 1876.
[Term of Patent $3\frac{1}{4}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, GEORGE W. GILL, of the city and county of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, have originated and designed a Centennial Locket, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustrations making part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, to which reference is made.

A, on one side of the locket, represents the Machinery Hall, one of the Centennial Buildings in Philadelphia, with the date of the Centennial year, 1876; and B, on the other side, represents Agricultural Hall, another of said buildings, which has also the date of the Centennial year, 1876. Instead of having the representation of both of these buildings, one on each side of the locket, I sometimes have the representation of only one of them, leaving the reverse side of the locket blank for an inscription.

What I claim as my invention is—

1. The design for a centennial locket having on one side a representation of Machinery Hall, one of the Centennial Buildings of Philadelphia, with the date of the Centennial year, 1876, substantially as described, and shown in the accompanying drawings.

2. The design for a locket having the representation of Agricultural Hall, one of the Centennial Buildings in Philadelphia, on one side, with the date of the Centennial year, 1876, substantially as described, and shown in the accompanying drawings.

3. The design for a centennial locket having the said Machinery Hall on one side, and Agricultural Hall on the reverse side, substantially as described, and shown in the accompanying drawings.
