

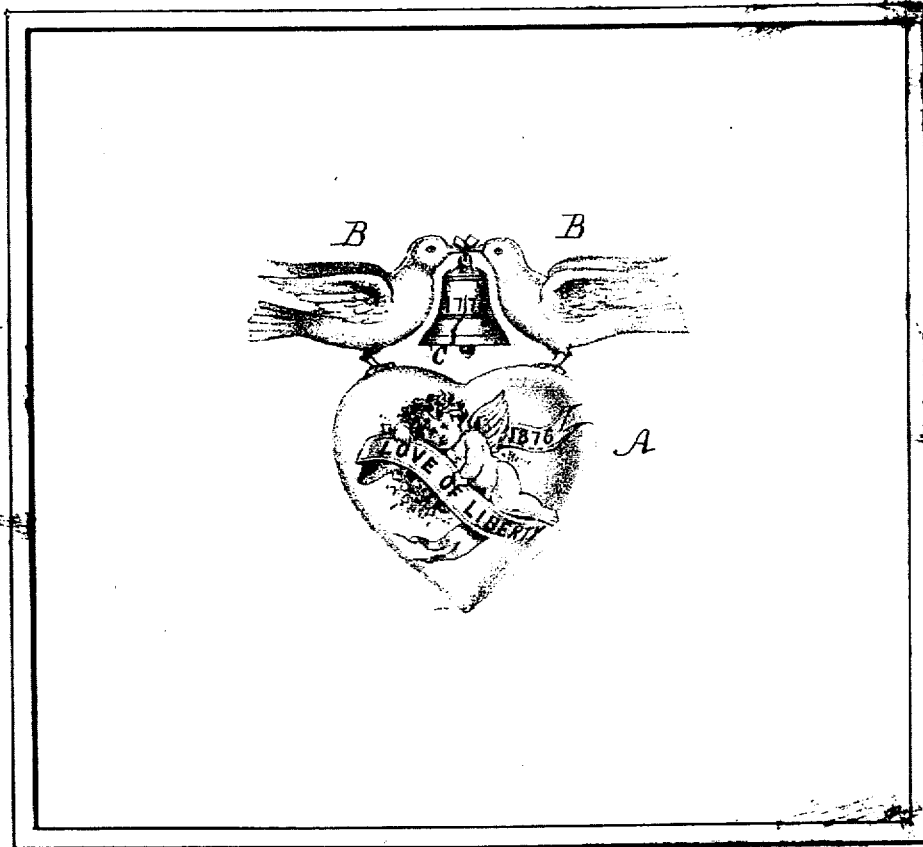

## DESIGN FOR CENTENNIAL BADGE.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,108**, dated February 22, 1876; application filed January 31, 1876.  
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, HENRY GUENTHER, of the city of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, have originated and designed a Pattern for Badges, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying lithographic illustration or drawing, making part of this specification.

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying lithographic illustration, to which reference is made, embodying a heart, having, in bass-relief, a winged cupid carrying a ribbon with the motto "1876, Love of Liberty," and two kissing birds standing upon the heart and supporting between them the Independence Bell marked "1776;" the whole together being intended to convey the idea of a patriotic love of liberty and independence.

A represents the heart bearing the winged cupid and motto, B B the two kissing birds, and C the Independence Bell of 1776 suspended between them.

It is my intention, in the production of my design, to form it of sheet metal, and also to print and photolithograph it upon paper, ribbon, and similar fabrics, as occasion may require.

What I claim as my invention is—

A design for a centennial badge, composed of the heart A, birds B B, and bell C, substantially as described and shown.
