

DESIGN FOR FLAG-STAFF BRACKETS.

Specification forming part of Design No. 9,123, dated March 7, 1876; application filed February 16, 1876.

[Term of Patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOSEPH P. MILLER, of the city and county of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, have originated and designed a Flag-Staff Bracket, of which the following is a specification:

The nature of my design is fully represented in the accompanying photographic illustration, making part of this specification, to which reference is made.

My design consists in a flag-staff bracket, composed of a base piece or plate of any form suitable for attachment to a window-sill, sign, roof, or other object, and a socket or sockets in the form of an Independence Bell, in which the flag-staff is to be inserted.

The base-piece may be slotted or provided

with holes for serews or bolts, and the socket or sockets may be inclined, as shown, vertical, or project substantially in line with the basepiece, according to the position in which the bracket is designed to be used. One or more sockets may be attached to the base-plate, either to hold more than one flag-staff, or to give additional steadiness with a single one.

I claim as my invention-

A design for a flag-staff bracket, consisting of a base-piece, combined with a socket or sockets in the form of a bell, substantially as set forth.
